#### Everyone Hates the Editor

"Publishing a hometown newspaper has many compensations," writes Ray K. Dover of the Valentine (Neb.) newspaper, "but being well-liked is not one of them." "Everyone," he says, "hates the editor." More specifically:

"An editor who takes a firm stand on controversial issues, and tries to print all the news in an unbiased manner, may be respected (in a fair-minded community), but he will never be popular."

"Sooner or later," promises Mr. Dover, "such an editor will tread on the toes of everyone who reads the paper, be he friend or foe, neighbor or stranger."

This editor lists as the "prime sources of an editor's woes" weddings, obituaries and court news, noting such pitfalls as failure to describe grandmother's dress in the wedding story or to include Uncle Joe's favorite poem in the obit.

"Other ways to incur the wrath of readers are: Disagree with them on a school issue, misspell their names, give another church more space than you do theirs—decline to work at night on a rush printing job for someone who would have ordered it out of town to begin with had he not been in a hurry—etc., etc., etc."

"We sometimes think," concludes editor Dover, "what really irritates readers is his refusal to drop dead. That seems to be the only way to please a big majority at one time."

Private interment rites for Ulrich Herman Neiger were conducted at Nyssa cemetery Wednesday morning, July 25, 1962, by Lienkaemper funeral home.

A memorial service was conducted Wednesday afternoon by Pastor John A. Milbrath in Faith Lutheran church. Organ music was provided by Mrs. Jim Thiel.

Mr. Neiger was born Aug. 10, 1893, in Tillamook, Ore., a son of John and Barbara Raz Neiger. He was united in marriage April 26, 1931, to Alice Wilson in Tillamook.

In 1950 the family came to the Nyssa area where Mr. Neiger was engaged in farming until his retirement several years ago. He was a member of Faith Lutheran church in Nyssa and an active member of the church council.

He succumbed Sunday, July 22, 1962, following a sudden heart attack.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by one son, Rex of Salem; two daughters, Mrs. Royce (Barbara) Chadwick of Madras and Miss Janelle Neiger of the home.

Other survivors include three grandchildren and three sisters, Mrs. Hulda Zihler, Miss Priska Neiger and Miss Martha Neiger, all of Portland.

#### Nyssa, Boise Services Held for F. Asumendi

The rosary was recited for Francisco Asumendi Friday morning, July 20, 1962, at Lienkaemper chapel in Nyssa.

Concluding services were conducted Saturday morning at Schreiber and Gibson chapel in Boise, with interment in St. John's section of Morris Hill cemetery in the Idaho capital city.

Mr. Asumendi was born June 22, 1894, in Genein, Biscaya, Spain. He came to the United States at the age of 17 years and was a sheepherder in Idaho until he came to the Nyssa area approximately 20 years ago and farmed until his retirement in 1961.

He was united in marriage Jan. 31, 1930, to Jesusa Astoreca in Boise. Mr. Asumendi was affiliated with the Catholic church.

He succumbed July 17, 1962, following an extended illness. He entered the hospital Feb. 11 of this year, was released May 1 and had resided since that time at the home of his son, Jess Asumendi on route 2, Nyssa.

In addition to his son, he is survived by one stepson, Gabriel Astoreca of Nyssa; two stepdaughters, Mrs. Harold Lenon of Boise and Mrs. M. A. Quigley of Clarkston, Wash.; a brother, Domingo Asumendi of Meridian and nine grandchildren. His wife preceded him in death in 1934.
