School Entry Requires Child Birth Certificate

Parents who have children entering school for the first time this fall will undoubtedly be required to have a copy of the child's birth certificate when they register.

Birth certificates are obtained from the Vital Statistics Section of the State Board of Health in Portland.

Normally in the spring and late fall some 900 requests a week come in. But with the approach of the school season the demand climbs to 2,400 requests during the last week in August.

It is hoped that parents will order birth certificates now and avoid swamping the Vital Statistics Section.

A photocopy of a record is \$2.00. Checks should be made out to the Oregon State Board of Health and the accompanying letter should give the full name of the child, the date of birth, place of birth and the name of the parents.
