**Hirai Gives Onion And Potato Report**

Good yield prospects for Sweet Spanish onions in Colorado have been reported by Roy Hirai of Nyssa, following a survey trip through the area last week. Colorado is the major area competing with Malheur county and south west Idaho in production of Sweet Spanish onions.

Hirai toured the area of the Arkansas valley and the farming district north of Denver. He reported onion tops standing waist high, with stands good over most of the area. Hirai noted some hail damage in the area, and reported this is a constant threat to onion production in the high elevation of the Colorado fields. He pointed out that yield prospects are good, and that with an increase over last year in acres planted the Colorado area could put out a large volume of onions.

Hirai made his crop tour enroute home from a Washington, D. C. meeting of the National Potato Advisory Committee, on which he is the Oregon representative. He reported that the potato committee has recommended a referendum of growers on a nationwide cull regulation, and has recommended also that hearings be reopened this fall on establishment of a national potato marketing order.

The committee also recommended compulsory grade inspection on potatoes to make the restriction on marketing culls effective.

The potato advisory committee was called together July 12 by Robert Duncon Jr., Assistant Secretary of Agriculture. Purpose of this meeting was to review results of seven regional hearings on a national marketing agreement held last spring.

Hirai also observed potato production and marketing in the Colorado area during his visit there. He noted that reds are ready for harvest, and that the area has crops of the Early Gem variety with about the same size as the same variety here.

He visited areas in northern Colorado where potato production is being started with well irrigation on land previously used for dry land wheat. One operation visited used a single automatic sprinkler setup to irrigate a quarter section of land, with the sprinkler pipe carried on wheels and rotating in a continuous circle throughout the irrigating season.
