Sen. Neuberger Explains Negative Vote on Sugar Act

The sugar act of 1962 which

President Kennedy recently signed into law establishes quotas for both foreign and domestic sugar producers. I favored provisions of the law granting larger quotas to domestic growers. However, I had serious reservations about the size of the premium price paid to foreign producers and the lobbying maneuvers of 22 governments seeking a slice of the \$550-million subsidy melon. In my opinion, these factors and other shortcomings of the bill outweighed the benefits to our domestic industry so I joined in voting against it.

American consumers pay a subsidy of about 2.8 cents per pound over the world market price for sugar. This premium above the world market price amounts to about \$225-million on the 4-million tons of sugar we import. This is an attractive sum to foreign producers. Evidence of this fact is that 22 governments had lobbyists working in Washington this year in hope of get-

ting a sugar quota allotment. They have been successful.

It seems to me that this lobbying activity is a temptation to foreign countries. It raises the question: "If lobbying works in sugar, why not try it in other areas? Perhaps military or economic foreign aid." Some of these lobbyists were paid a flat fee plus a commission for each ton the country's quota was increased.

As a result of the blatant lobbying activities on the sugar bill, the Senate has authorized the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to conduct an exhaustive study of the sugar lobby. Perhaps when Congress again considers sugar legislation, the American public will have a better understanding of the sugar subsidy program.

Daily News Reports On Potato Shipments, Prices to Be Given

Oregon's request for a 13-cent per hundred pounds reduction in eastbound rail freight rates on potatoes is now before the western railroad's standing rate committee.

The request was considered by the railroad's Freight Traffic Managers committee July 23. This group referred it to the rate committee for investigation and report.

This advice was received in wires and letters to Paul T. Rowell, agricultural development chief for the state department of agriculture.

Oregon's move for a reduction was filed by the Oregon Public Utility commissioner and joined in by the state department of agriculture to aid Oregon growers

Malheur county shippers need the reduction to compete on their eastbound movement. Washington shippers also have requested compensatory reductions for the same reasons.

The reduction, if granted, would also affect central Oregon and Klamath potato producers to some extent, although their out-of-state shipments go primarily to California markets, according to Rowell.
