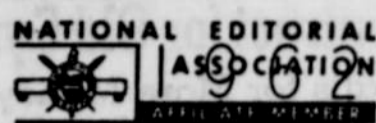

**Minister Gets Doctor of Philosophy Degree From University in Scotland**

The Rev. G. J. Kuiper was awarded the degree of doctor of philosophy on June 29, 1962, by the University of St. Andrews in the city of St. Andrews, Scotland. Mr. Kuiper is minister of the Kingman Memorial Community church, The United Presbyterian church in the U.S.A. at Adrian.

The thesis, entitled "The Pseudo-Jonathan Targum and Its Relationship to Targum Onkelos," is a study of first-century Palestinian Aramic, the language in which Jesus taught. This research gives an additional help in the study of the New Testament, especially of the Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles.

Mr. Kuiper was graduated from the College of Idaho in Caldwell in 1954 with a bachelor of arts degree, and from the San Francisco Theological seminary, San Anselmo, Calif. (a seminary of the United Presbyterian church in the U.S.A.) in 1957 and 1958 with the degrees B.D., cum laude, and S.T.M., cum laude.

In addition to the University of St. Andrews, he has studied at the Karl-Ruprecht Universitat of Heidelberg, Germany, and under Professor Paul E. Kahle in Oxford, England. Mr. Kuiper has been asked to teach the evening course on the Life of Christ at the College of Idaho this autumn.

**Bill Hiltz Services Held in Salem Chapel**

Wellington Marshall Hiltz, better known in this area as Bill Hiltz, son of Marshall Hiltz and Mary Wagg Hiltz, was born at Sandusky, Mich., May 5, 1901, and succumbed in Salem on Aug. 5, 1962, at the age of 61 years and 3 months.

When he was five years of age his parents moved to Alberta, Canada, to homestead. The following year his mother died and was buried in a homemade casket on the homestead, near the present town of Hardisty, Alberta, Canada. His father's death six years later left him an orphan at the age of 12.

He grew to manhood on the prairies of western Canada. When he was about 28 years of age he went east to visit relatives in Ontario province, Canada, and the state of Michigan. Following his visit in the east, he went to the western United States and finally settled in the Treasure Valley area, where he spent most of his time until his death. A short time ago, he moved to Salem.

He married Doris Campbell after coming to Treasure Valley. In addition to his widow, Doris Campbell Hiltz of Hemingford, Neb., survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Dorothy Mundt of

**Don Parkers Attend Two-Day Meeting Of Meat Processors**

Mr. and Mrs. Don Parker spent a recent weekend in Bend where they attended a meeting of the Oregon Independent Meat Processors association.

Dr. Houston, head of meat inspection for the state department of agriculture, was speaker at a banquet held Saturday evening.

A luncheon was held Sunday at Pilot Butte Inn, followed by an afternoon meeting. The group discussed plans for presenting a bill for legislation that requires mobile slaughter trucks to conform with state regulations as the plants are now required to do. It was noted that operators of these units are not complying with regulations which must be brought up to state law for protection of the public at large.

It is now possible for mobile slaughter units to butcher animals not fit for human consumption. The new law would eradicate this. Several of these units are now in operation in the state of Oregon.

To the Editor:

Every supporter of fair representation in Oregon's Legislature, based upon people rather than area, should be concerned that the Associated Oregon Industries area representation plan, variously described as the "Annala Plan," the "Citizens Committee Plan," or "Ballot Proposition Number 9," is being presented to the voters at the November 6 General Election. While I am confident that the voters will defeat this vicious proposal, if they understand what it is intended to accomplish, unfortunately, Oregon's Supreme Court refused to approve a properly descriptive ballot title.

In view of all the national publicity on reapportionment, many voters, unless they are informed to the contrary, may think that a more representative rather than a less representative proposal is being submitted to them. This is not the case.

The people's best recourse is to support the efforts of the Bipartisan Committee to Retain Equal Representation to defeat this undemocratic proposal. No one but selfish special interests is ever benefited by the destruction of grass roots democracy which this amendment proposes.

Fortunately, on the question of the adoption of this proposal, every man and woman in Oregon will have an equal voice, with each being entitled to cast one vote, without regard to how much land he owns, where he lives or how wealthy he is. I cannot believe that the people of Oregon will knowingly give up their sacred right to an equal voice in government.

Oregon has the most representative legislature of any of the United States. Let's stay in first place and not take "9" steps backwards!!!

the blank check we've been extending ever since the war, but the question remains, will they still be doing it in a free society?

I have been concerned by the menace of Communist China—by its future potential and by the threat it poses today, not only to the countries it borders, but in the overall, to us. This concern has been multiplied many times by what I have seen in Asia, and I wonder that it is not shared by every thinking American.

**"Recognition Means Retreat"**

Contrary to my opponent, Senator Morse, I am rock-solid in my belief that we cannot survive by stroking the dragon's back or that sweet words and soft phrases will satisfy his hunger. Instead, I am convinced that "accommodation" to the Reds means surrender, that recognition means retreat, and that "peaceful" coexistence means enslavement of Free Asia.

Although hedging on these questions is shocking to voters of both parties, it is no more shocking than to note during my absence that the Senior Senator from Oregon has been the leader in a filibuster that insulted his own party leaders, confounded the work of the Senate, delayed vital appropriations and stalled the machinery of government—all for the purpose of developing an issue for his personal fall campaign.

It should be evident that while I have been looking, listening and learning, Senator Morse has been babbling, blaring and boring his colleagues and the people of Oregon.
