Oregon Livestock, Poultry Industry Hurt by Feed Grain Market Problem

Various factors at work in feed grain markets are seriously handicapping the Pacific Northwest livestock and poultry feeding industry, report Oregon State university economists.

This spring, Northwest feeders were paying nearly \$15 a ton more for feed grain than their midwestern competitors, making it difficult for the local industry to compete in the market place, explained Harold F. Hollands and M. D. Thomas, agricultural economists at OSU.

Government action, population trends, value of money, agricultural technology, transportation rates and facilities, and livestock and poultry prices all play a part in the effect of price spreads on the feeding industry, with government action being a most important factor at this time, they say.

Simply stated, the problem is that livestock feeders in the Pacific Northwest have had to buy their feed at prices above government support levels, while in the midwest feed grains are selling below supports.

Federal Action Blamed

The difference has come about largely through federal action, the economists continued. They explained that although grain support prices reflect generally acceptable relationships among grains and grain producing areas, subsequent actions have seriously distorted feed grain price relationships to the disadvantage of the northwest feeding industry.

Overall, U.S. feed grain stocks are very large and the government has provided means for exporting them as one way to help reduce stocks. The export program has been very successful in regard to barley, chief feed grain grown in the northwest, particularly since barley is preferred to corn or milo by many countries where it is used as a food.

However, barley exports, aided by government, have prevented any build-up of regional stocks in the Pacific Northwest and as a result market prices have been held above support levels in this region.

Prices Below Support Levels

In contrast, the government holds large supplies of corn and milo in the midwest and is following a policy of selling some of the available stocks below support prices, with the result that market prices of feed grains are

Representative Stunz told the group that state taxes were going to be the big issue at the next session of the legislature. He pointed out that \$30 million surplus which existed two years ago in the state's coffers is almost gone and that demands for additional money for governmental services is greater than ever.

The incumbent legislator stated that he would do everything he could to hold the line on taxes and to reapportion present revenues to those state projects most worthy.

Stunz also discussed the proposed Ontario highway bridge and the Succor creek highway. He said these projects would not raise taxes since funds for them would come from highway department money derived from gas taxes, truck taxes and similar sources of revenue.

Stunz pledged to work for the Ontario highway bridge and the Succor creek highway as he did for improvement of the Lake Owyhee road and he is hopeful of success.

OSU to Host Large Scientific Meeting Aug. 26 Through 31

Oregon State university will play host Aug. 26 to 31 to the largest scientific meeting in Pacific Northwest history.

More than 4,000 biological scientists are expected to participate in the joint meetings of the American Institute of Biological Sciences and the Pacific division of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

AIBS is composed of 27 scientific societies and 23 affiliate societies, with some 85,000 members in all. Thirty-seven scientific groups will be meeting concurrently during the week.

More than 2,100 research papers will be presented during the meetings. Keynote speaker will be Dr. Melvin Calvin, California chemist who won a Nobel prize. He will report on possibilities of life on other planets.

The scientists and some 2,000 wives and children who will accompany them to the OSU conference will fill all of the campus dormitories and will be housed in off-campus homes and some sorority and fraternity houses, in addition to hotels and motels of the area.

Special provisions have been made also for camping facilities on grassed areas next to the OSU football stadium. More than 125 families already have requested camp sites.

Dr. Roy A. Young, head of the department of botany and plant pathology, is general campus chairman for the conference. OSU President James H. Jensen was president of one of the AIBS societies in 1955.

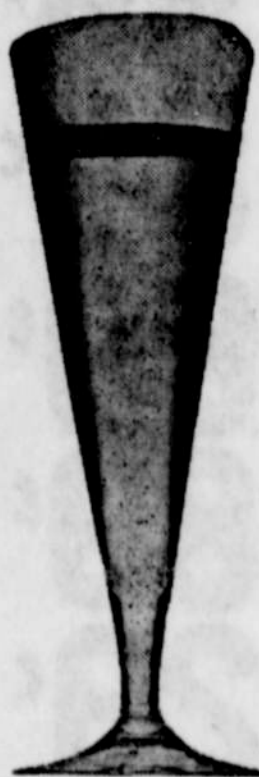

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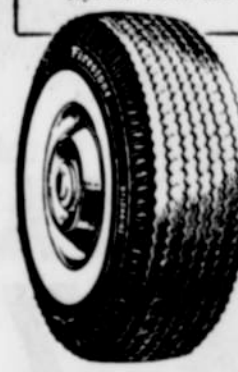
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
