bring from home. Cost will be 15 cents per week.

Afternoon milk will be served daily in the classrooms, beginning Sept. 5, for 15 cents a week.

To save valuable classroom instruction time, each teacher will collect milk and lunch money every Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

It will be appreciated, Mrs. Poor said, if money is not sent on days other than Mondays. Milk and lunches should be paid for on a weekly or monthly basis. Each child should pay his own teacher for lunches or milk. Parents are asked not to send one check to pay several children's accounts.

If a child is absent, credit for lunches or afternoon milk will be carried forward on his or her account.

School Insurance Available

Parents are reminded that school insurance information and registration forms will be sent home with children on Tuesday, Sept. 4. This insurance is not in effect until the fee (\$2.00) and signed registration are received by the student's teacher.

Registration for first graders will be held in the primary school building Thursday and Friday, Aug. 23-24, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Parents are asked to remember (1) to bring the child's birth certificate, (2) that the child's physical examination should be completed and the goldenrod sheet sent to county health office, (3) a \$1.50 fee for the child's school supplies for the year and (4) school insurance may be paid, \$2 per year, at this time.

processing the products for their livelihood. And further, that immediate prospects for any change in this is rather remote.

With this in mind, the council felt that any reasonable changes that could be made to aid students interested in agriculture and livestock production and adults desiring more education in these fields should be provided, and in the long run would be an excellent investment for the entire community. Student enrollment for this school year will be 50 to 55.

Specific Improvements Listed

The group felt the new facilities would offer these specific improvements: (1) enable better learning of farm machinery repair, (2) attract more enrollment of students in vo-ag and enable more adult classes to be held in the shop, (3) provide more sanitary conditions for all, (4) offer better safety in less congested space and through better exits in case of fire or explosion, (5) adequate storage for work material (lumber and steel), (6) permit better supervision through shop being visible from adjoining classroom.

Members of the Nyssa Vocational Agriculture Advisory Council, who work with Instructor Carl Devin throughout the year are Harold Dail, chairman; members, Harold Kurtz, Allen Jones, Glenn Peterson, Neil Petterson, Ernie Metcalf, Leonard Hewett and Jay Gibson.

Sunday dinner guests of Mrs. Kate Herriman were Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Claar of Boise.

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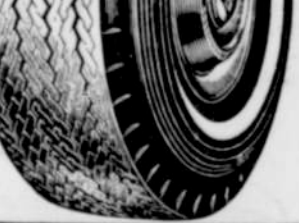
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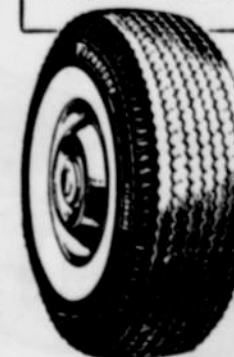
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
