Stunz Well-Pleased With Primary Vote

Don Benson, chairman of the Stunz for Representative Non-partisan club, stated today that the results of the Oregon primary election as officially published by the secretary of state of Oregon were particularly gratifying and indicated that State Representative Emil A. Stunz received strong support in Harney county.

Stunz received 700 Democratic votes and 42 Republican write-in votes for a total of 742. His opponent in the coming election, Robert F. Smith of Burns, polled 626 Republican votes and two Democratic write-ins for a total of 628 votes.

Benson stated that during the past several elections Stunz has received strong support from both Democratic and Republican voters in Malheur county and the official election returns from Harney county indicate that he will likewise be supported by voters from
