

Effects of Social Changes on Churches Discussed in New Books at Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, Sept. 1, at Malheur county library include the following:

"Man in Rapid Social Change" by Egbert de Vries. A review of social changes, occurring especially among the newly emerging nations, to try and determine how the churches can meet the challenges these changes present.

"The Churches and Rapid Social Change" by Paul Abrecht. An examination of the social and economic changes in modern Asia, Africa and South America and the effect on the churches there.

"Towards One World" by George Pearson. An outline of world history from 1600 to 1960.

"Australia: The Quiet Continent" by Douglas Pike. By relating the geographic features of Australia to its history, the author has produced a compact book, whose value is increased by copious illustrations, maps and charts.

"Book Reviewing for an Audience" by Evelyn Oppenheimer. A practical guide.

"Book of Safe Driving" by the editors of Sports Illustrated magazine. Three of the world's greatest automobile drivers give important tips on driving conditions, situations and dangers, safety procedures and equipment.

"Total Picture Control" by Andreas Feininger. One of the greatest photographers in the world takes the reader from the placement and lighting of the subject through every step required to achieve not merely professional but prize-winning results.

"How to Win at Bowling" by Frank Clause. A sound, systematic handbook for the novice or more experienced player by a top-flight bowling instructor who discusses equipment and defines basic elements of good form.

"These Were the Sioux" by Mari Sandoz. This brief account of the Sioux in a vanished age shows their fierceness in battle, contrasting gentleness in family life, wisdom and resignation to their tragedy.

"So Brief a Journey" by Margaret Echard. An adroit novel catering to perennial reader curiosity concerning the medical profession.

"The Northwest Corner" by Murray Morgan. Words and pictures are combined to form a portrait of the Pacific Northwest.

Nyssans Bag Antelope and Steelhead



MRS. NICK SMIT, 66, of route 2, Nyssa, displays the head and attached hide of an antelope having an unusual set of horns. Space between the tips of the horns measures 15 inches. Length of the horns is approximately 12 inches. Mrs. Smit bagged the animal on an old-age permit on her very first antelope hunt. She said he was first shot in the leg and crippled, then the party trailed him for 7½ hours, up and down hills near McDonald lake and Squatters butte, about 30 miles from Westfall. Mrs. Smit and her husband, Nick, hunted Saturday and Sunday with his nephew, John, and his son, Gary and Pete, and Mr. Smit's son-in-law, Larry Marostica, and his son, Bert. The latter was also successful on his very first antelope hunt. The party saw only three other bucks besides the two they killed. Needless to say, Mrs. Smit was a thrilled but tired nimrod returning Sunday with her kill.



THE LARGEST of these two steelheads brought a trophy to Clyde Long of 215 East Ehrgood in Nyssa. The "big one" weighed 7¼ pounds and was nearly 30 inches in length. The other one tipped the scales at 4½ pounds. Mr. and Mrs. Long and grandson, Jerry Long, spent the weekend on Grand Ronde river near Troy, Ore., where Long caught the fish last Sunday morning. The Nyssa fisherman said this was his fourth year to try for the big ones and this was his first really successful trip. They made their headquarters at the lodge of Red and Mary Sargent and the Nyssans says he recommends their place very highly, not only as fishing headquarters, but also for hunters in pursuit of deer, elk, quail or chukars. Owners of the lodge presented the trophy to Long as they do to all fishermen catching anything over seven pounds. The award is a small bronze fisherman equipped with pole, net and creel, on an ivory base.
