Imagine that your salary or gross income is \$8,200 a year, that your debts are \$30,000, that they increased \$390 last year and you are planning to go \$700 more in debt this year.

Your friends and your banker tell you that if you continue this you are heading for bankruptcy.

So you talk it over with the other members of the family and draw up a budget for next year.

But instead of cutting down on expenses you decide you will spend \$340 more than this year. You do this on the assumption your income will be more, although the chances are very indefinite.

A family living this far beyond its means would get little sympathy from most, if the going got rough.

Yet, add SEVEN ciphers to these figures and you have the situation of our federal government and can see where it is headed under the present administration.

We would not be so alarmed over the situation if it appeared there were an end of the deficit spending in sight but there isn't. The president's Harvard advisers, along with quite a number of our federal lawmakers, seem to think we should keep on spending on the domestic front until we have reached a new peak of prosperity and there is no unemployment. And on the foreign front until we have poured our tax money into every newly formed country in an effort to buy their friendship before Russia can get to them with its communistic propaganda.

Hearing Tests Given in Oregon For Young People

The Oregon State Board of Health reported that it gave over 175,000 hearing tests to Oregon children last school year. About four percent of these children were referred to their family physician for diagnosis and treatment.

"The most common causes of hearing loss in children are enlarged or infected tonsils and adenoids, obstructions such as wax or foreign objects in the ear canal, middle ear infections, abnormal eardrums and diseases in the nose and throat," Carl Ashley, M. D., Director of Maternal and Child Health said. "The problem is to find the hearing loss early enough."

The Oregon State Board of Health routinely screens all of Oregon's elementary and junior high school children in the odd numbered grades each year. Children in other grades, including high school, are also tested when referred by a teacher or a public health nurse.

The Board also tests one and one-half to five year olds. This was started two years ago and is continuing this summer. "We are trying to discover hearing loss as early in life as possible because the sooner it is found the better it is for the child to learn at his full potential," the Doctor said. Two out of every three children with a hearing loss in this age group can be corrected through medical treatment.

Oregon is one of the first states in the nation to carry on a pre-school hearing testing program. A film has been made on this program entitled, "Why Wait". It can be borrowed free of charge from the Health Education and Information Section in the Portland State Office Building.

RULES FOR DELINQUENCY

It's easy to rear delinquent children, says a man who knows more than he'd like about delinquents. He's Charles E. Lewis, the Bremerton, Wash., chief of police—a tough grizzled man who has seen many things, including thousands of youngsters gone wrong.

He has a dozen rules for parents whose ambition is to bring up a bunch of delinquents. Here they are, in all their glory—easy to follow and infallible:

—Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants; thus he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living.

—When he picks up naughty words, laugh; this will make him think he's cute and encourage him to pick up even cuter phrases.

—Never give him any spiritual training; wait until he's 21 and let him "decide for himself."

—Avoid use of the word "wrong"—it might give him a complex; this will condition him to believe later, when (not if, where) he is arrested for stealing a car that society is against him and that he is being persecuted.

—Pick up everything he leaves lying around, and other wise do everything for him so he will gain experience at throwing all responsibility on others.

—Let him read anything he can get his hands on; be careful the silverware and glasses are sterilized, but let his mind feast on garbage.

—Quarrel frequently in his presence, so he won't be shocked when the home breaks up later.

—Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort; denial may lead to harmful frustration.

—Take his part against neighbors, teachers and policemen—they are all prejudiced.

—Give a child all the spending money he wants and never make him earn his own (why should he

Dear Editor:

An article appeared in the August 30th issue of the Gate City Journal concerning the primary election results of State Representatives Robert F. Smith and Emil Stunz. I would like to point out several items of this news release that are not factual.

Don Benson, chairman of the Stunz for Representative club, said that Stunz received 42 Republican write-in votes in Harney county while Representative Robert F. Smith received only 2 Democratic write-in votes.

Almost the reverse is true, according to a recent telegram from Jack Thompson, state director of elections. Representative Robert F. Smith received 40 Democratic write-in votes in Harney county and 3 write-in votes in Malheur county, for a total of 43 write-in votes. Emil Stunz received 2 Republican write-in votes in Harney county and 7 write-in votes in Malheur county for a total of 9 write-in votes.

Smith Leads Party Ticket

Representative Robert F. Smith led the Republican ticket in the primary in both Malheur and Harney counties with a total of 2752 votes. Mr. Stunz did not lead the Democratic ticket but received a total of 2344 votes or more than 400 votes less than Smith. Representative Bob Smith received a total of 34 more write-in votes than Stunz.

I am sure Mr. Benson merely misread the figures of the official abstract. I believe it is my duty to the voters of Malheur county to correct these mistakes because of Representative Robert F. Smith's outstanding record as a legislator in the 1961 session of the Oregon State Legislature.
