Adrian Schools Show Enrollment Increase; Home Game Friday

According to Glenn Ward, Adrian school superintendent, a total of 139 students are registered in the high school, including 39 freshmen, 46 sophomores, 32 juniors and 22 seniors.

Grade school students registered by grade are 60 first grade, 43 second, 48 third, 55 fourth, 35 fifth, 51 sixth, 38 seventh and 37 eighth, making a total of 367 youngsters.

This makes a total enrollment of 506 students at Adrian schools which is an increase of 25 over last year's figure of 481.

The superintendent said the Adrian Antelopes will host Wilder's football squad Friday night at 8 o'clock for the first home game of the season.

Banks Top Lenders to State Farmers; Credit Needs Increase, Study Shows

Oregon banks remain a major source of credit and other financial services to agriculture, according to Leonard Hewett, manager, First National Bank of Oregon, Nyssa branch.

Based on the 21st annual farm lending summary of the Agricultural committee of the American Bankers association, Hewett reported that at the beginning of the year, Oregon banks were helping farmers with \$80 million in loans, 16 percent more than a year previous. This total included \$63 million in production loans and \$17 million in farm mortgages.

At the same time, \$50 million in farm loans was held by life insurance companies, \$48 million by the Federal Land Banks, \$37 million by Production Credit associations and \$6 million in non-real estate loans, plus \$10 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home administration. About 59 percent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Oregon farmers came from banks.

Broaden Services to Farmers

Hewett said, "Bankers in Oregon, as well as throughout the country, are taking a realistic look at agriculture, appraising it from the standpoint of its total contribution to the economy. Through the years the agricultural industry, as a part of the total economy, has remained relatively stable,

Main near Snake river bridge, was filed by owners, Manuel and Mary Defuentes. If approved by the state control board, this will fill Nyssa's allowable number based on present population. Other holders of licenses of this type are Twilight Lounge and Brownie's Lounge, both on Main street.

Lodging licenses were approved for Riverside Cabins, Fox Cabins and Chadwick Cabins. These were withheld at the last regular meeting pending the owners conforming to city ordinances governing same.

The election Oct. 2 will be for voters to pass on sale of bonds to pay for intersections of streets and alleys in the 12 blocks of paving in various parts of town.

Petitions for the paving, curbing and guttering have previously been approved by the property owners affected and they will pay the amounts levied based on front footage, with the amounts being a lien upon the property.

Employee Accidents Reviewed

Charles Middleton of the State Industrial Accident commission reviewed Nyssa's five-year experience on accident claims paid for city employees and told what might be done to save money on these costs in the future. His figures showed that the city had expended \$5,947.46 for coverage during the past five years while expenses and claims paid by the state for the same period totaled \$32,167.62.

Included in this figure was the amount paid under a fatality claim in 1958.

Middleton advocated a safety training program to make employees more accident conscious.

Other Business Transacted

Councilmen heard City Manager Art Colby's progress report on the widening of East Main street, painting the water storage tanks and the urban planning program. Council approved purchase of a Royal electric typewriter for the city clerk's office in the amount of \$427.50 and discussed improvements needed on sidewalks in the 100 block on Main street. Colby was authorized to make a study of this to determine if the property owners would be interested in a uniform repair or replacement plan.

Nyssa's Special Education Program Covers Many Areas; Functions Noted

Special education, as it functions in the Nyssa schools, has a number of areas. These include speech correction classes, individual reading instruction, help for children who have visual and hearing difficulties, psychometric testing, supervision of a special class for retarded children, arrangements for home teaching programs and providing services for crippled children.

It is interesting to note that there are days when just one of the above areas will completely fill one day. At such times it is necessary to place the emphasis in that area until the problems have been resolved to the extent that they can be set aside for the time being and the time used in another area.

Six Require Special Services

There are six children in the elementary grades of the Nyssa schools who are crippled to the extent that they require services over and beyond those provided in the regular classroom. They must receive physical therapy on a routine basis.

Arrangements must be made for special conferences so that both the school and the parents are working closely toward the same goals. Special agencies need to be contacted in regard to brace fittings and continual brace repair.

Last Wednesday was a good example of what is meant by area emphasis in special education. This was one of the days when Miss Marcelle Montgomery, physical therapist, was in Nyssa, so half-hour appointments were set up for the entire day.

Busy Schedule Followed

Five mothers came with their children. Four personal calls were made to homes. In addition to these, there were six conferences regarding therapy to be given. In two cases the classroom teacher was also present. During the afternoon a specialist from Brownfield's Orthopedic Appliance Shop in Boise called at the school and worked with Miss Montgomery to properly fit braces.

These crippled children are certified by the State Department of Education as being handicapped children who require special services in order to attend school. The program is approved by the state department and the Nyssa School district receives reimbursement on a percentage basis.

School Zone Jaywalking Prohibited, Says Police Chief; Penalties Listed

Nyssa area drivers are reminded by Police Chief Bob Love that resumption of school means school zone speeds again apply. Oregon law designates 20 miles per hour as a reasonable speed when passing school grounds or school crossings when children are going to or from school or during recess periods.

Chief Love said the first few weeks of school usually present special problems for both drivers and children. Drivers forget school has started and children forget to watch out for cars in the excitement of play or going to and from school.

The officer stated his department will give special enforcement attention in school areas but urged each driver to take it upon himself to police his speed near schools.

Jaywalking Laws Enforced

Jaywalking, the biggest danger to both motorists and children in the school zone, is strictly forbidden and laws will be heavily enforced this year, Chief Love stated. Many complaints have been noted regarding this problem in past years and they are well taken.

Students disregarding the traffic safety patrolmen and crosswalks have placed a great danger on the safety of themselves and those who are in the crosswalks. Students who have been crossing Main street to the eastern point of the island at the "Y" have placed an extreme danger to those children who are crossing Main street north of the island, and within the crosswalk.

A motorist stops for the jaywalkers and as soon as they are clear he starts up and suddenly is upon the regular crosswalk which is frequently full of chil-

dren. Love stated there have been some very close calls in these situations and enforcement will be stepped up.

Motorists Cautioned

Children are not the only ones at fault by any means, Love noted, as many motorists are traveling at excessive speeds in the school zone, unloading children into the street from their vehicles and failing to take extra caution in approaching the school safety patrolmen's flags.

Chief Love stated a new program has been undertaken this year with the school patrolmen and better safety teaching of both the general student body and the school safety patrol members as its aim.

Policy to Be Adopted

The following policy has been established in handling jaywalking violations in the school zone: First offense—A form letter will be sent to parents notifying them of the offense and a copy to the school principal.

Second offense—An appearance in Nyssa city court by parents or legal guardians and the student. Additional violations—Possibility of remand to Malheur County Juvenile court as a delinquent.

"We sincerely hope that none of these steps become necessary and with the proper cooperation I am sure they will not. The children are our future and their protection is Number One," Love concluded.
