City Librarian Lists Recent Additions Of Books Available to Nyssa Readers

City Librarian Joy Bell has released the following list of new books now available at Nyssa library:

ADULT BOOKS:

"Scott Fitzgerald" by Andrew Turnbull. This biography offers a matchless portrait of a great American writer who was also an extraordinarily appealing human being. Everything of consequence that happened to Fitzgerald is recorded here with the narrative vigor of a novel—from his childhood in St. Paul to Princeton, N.Y. in the 1920's, the French Riviera, Baltimore and finally Hollywood.

"Night Drop" by S. L. A. Marshall. The author has told the story of Normandy in such a way that the fate of these thousands of soldiers is made vivid for the first time. The reader will now know what is meant when the author says: "The battle scene in modern warfare is commonly an empty landscape."

"Home Is Where You Hang Yourself" by Cynthia Lindsey... or "How to Be a Woman and Who Needs It?"

"Why They Wrote" by Rhoda Hoff. This book explores the men and their works through their own words, including an excerpt from a representative word, and through the observations of their friends and critics.

"When Did It Happen?" by Stanford M. Mirkin. This dictionary is offered as history in capsule form to all those seekers of fact who are confronted with the perennial question, "When did it happen?"

"Words to Live By" edited by William Nichols. This volume represents a mosaic of what people are thinking and feeling in challenging times.

"A Victorian in Orbit" by Sir Cedric Hardwicke. This is a delightfully amusing, occasionally acerbic and always highly irreverent look at life spent entirely in the profession by one of the theatre's most distinguished and articulate protagonists.

"The Story of Your Brain and Nerves" by Edith Lucie Weart. Perhaps you will be surprised to learn how important the nervous system is to the life you live. The author has presented a simple, clear and exciting picture of the wonderfully complicated part of your body that allows you to speak, understand, hear, see, walk and do many other things.

"The Presidency" by Gerald W. Johnson. Here is living history, based on a matter that touches the life of every American. This book answers such questions as why no President has ever become a dictator, etc.

"Don't Just Stand There" by Inez Robb. The book has an entertaining chapter revealing the Robbs at home, which mirrors a warm and surprisingly typical American marriage.

"The Spirit of the Letter in Painting." Text by Jean Leymaire.

"Crusade Against Crime" edited by Jerry D. Lewis. Along with the story of crime-busters in action, we are also given an account of the scientific and philosophical aspects of the crusade against crime.

JUNIOR BOOKS:

"Jenny Lind and Her Listening Cat" by Frances Cavanah. Jenny could sing like a nightingale, but no one would have heard her had it not been for her listening cat. The story of how this small, appealing pet helped Jenny on her way to fame and fortune is as much a legend as was Jenny's lovely voice—but both were true.

"Tiger in the Bush" by Nan Chauncy.

"America on the Moon" by Jay Holmes. On May 25, 1961, President Kennedy spoke on the nation's role in space achievement. He inspired the title for this book when he said, "In a very real sense it will not be one man going to the moon, it will be an entire nation. For all of us must work to put him there."

"The Earth Beneath the Sea" by Francis P. Shepard. The author brings to life the drama of the earth beneath the sea, including the ever-changing shorelines of the world, our shifting beaches and the wealth of our continental shelves. A critical review of the evidence for high speed underwater currents is also given.

LDS Chapel Services Conducted Monday For Luther L. Fife, 78

Nyssa LDS stake chapel services for Luther Lachoneus Fife were conducted Monday afternoon, Sept. 10, 1962, under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home with Bishop Howard R. Bair officiating.

He succumbed last Thursday at his home after having suffered a stroke the previous week.

Mr. Fife was born Sept. 8, 1885, at Providence, Utah, a son of William and Finis Hemmingway Fife. He spent his early life in that city and was an active member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. He attended the agriculture college and university in Logan. In 1901 he began working in construction.

He moved to Weston, Idaho, in 1908 and married Lenora John in the Logan temple. Six children were born to this union, five of whom survive. They are Mrs. Maurine Dahle of Logan, Mrs. Gayle Jensen of Idaho Falls, Lavere Fife of Echo, Ore., Leo and Dean Fife of Nyssa. A daughter, Venna Veir, died in infancy.

On March 16, 1921, Mr. Fife was united in marriage to Louise Jensen Gannon, a widow with two sons, Henry and Jack Gannon, now of Othello. Five children were born following Mr. Fife's second marriage. They are Mrs. Lila Haroldsen of Seattle, Dennis Fife of Seattle, Mrs. Vivian Bair of Nyssa and Mrs. Betty Beus of Othello, Wash. One son, Duane, died at the age of nine years.

While living at Weston, he served as a teacher in the Sunday school and in the quorum of seventies as president and secretary; MIA president for six years and as counselor in the bishopric for 10 1/2 years. He also served as county commissioner in Franklin county for two years while living at Weston.

In 1934 the family moved to Nyssa where Mr. Fife was engaged in construction of the Owyhee project. Later he built mostly schools and churches, having overseen the erection of 20 LDS chapels, most of them in the Boise valley.

In June of 1935 he was called to serve as dependent branch president at Nyssa, Boise stake, and in 1936 was put in as branch president. In 1938 he was installed as bishop of the new Nyssa ward. He was later chosen to be first counselor to the president of the new Weiser stake, where he served until 1941. He was then called to be stake president, serving until 1949 when he was released due to ill health.

In 1953 Mr. and Mrs. Fife and daughter, Betty, were called to work in the Texas-Louisiana mission for the church, where Mr. Fife supervised the building of two chapels before returning to Nyssa.

In addition to his widow of the home, his sons, daughters and step-sons, he is survived by 48 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren.

Interment was made in Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Active pallbearers were grandsons of the deceased. Honorary bearers included Reuben Haroldsen, George Palmer, Gordon Williams, Henry Esplin and Bishop Frel Blair.
