

Two Nyssa Pioneer Ladies Succumb Following 60 Years in Community

LIRA NELLIE SHERWOOD—Funeral services for Mrs. Lira Nellie Sherwood, 88, will be conducted at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, Sept. 14, 1962, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Armand Larive of St. Paul's Episcopal church officiating.

Mrs. Sherwood succumbed Tuesday evening in Malheur Memorial hospital following an extended illness. She entered the hospital on Feb. 26 of this year and had been a patient there since that time.

Mrs. Sherwood was born Aug. 4, 1874, at Charlotte, Mich., a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Wade. She attended schools there and later taught in several country schools in Michigan.

On July 30, 1902, she was united in marriage to Henry R. Sherwood in a country church near Charlotte. Mr. Sherwood brought his bride to Nyssa soon after the wedding. They purchased the present homestead in 1903.

Mrs. Sherwood cooked for her first hay crew in a tent. At that time Arcadia was the townsite and she used to ride horseback from her home to purchase train tickets for travel.

The deceased was a member of the Presbyterian church but attended services at St. Paul's Episcopal church after there was no Presbyterian church in Nyssa.

She retired in April, 1961, from the Nyssa library board after serving as a member for 35 years. Fifteen of those years were served as chairman. Upon her retirement, an open house tea was given in her honor at the library and she was presented a corsage and gift.

Mrs. Sherwood had been active for many years in community affairs. She was a 4-H leader for over 15 years and a charter member of the Women's Civic club and hospital auxiliary.

In addition to Mr. Sherwood, she is survived by two sons, Frank of Nyssa, Don of Bridgeville, Del. and two grandchildren.

Interment will be made in Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home.

MRS. CLARA ANN BEAM

Funeral rites for Mrs. Clara Ann Beam, 90, were conducted Monday morning, Sept. 10, 1962, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa Methodist church officiating.

Mrs. Beam succumbed Saturday after six years being an invalid.

She was born Aug. 18, 1872, at Round Mountain, near Redding, Calif., a daughter of James and Sarah Calkins and attended schools there.

She was united in marriage on Dec. 25, 1901, to James Beam at Round Mountain. They moved to Nyssa in 1902 and had resided here since that time. Mr. Beam was killed in 1941 in an auto accident.

In earlier years Mrs. Beam was an active member of the Methodist Ladies' Aid society and attended Sunday school services regularly.

She was a thrifty housewife, making and selling her butter, caring for chickens and selling eggs to regular customers. She loved to work in her garden, was fond of flowers and always had numerous house plants and yard blossoms. For 60 years she resided on the same farm on the outskirts of Nyssa.

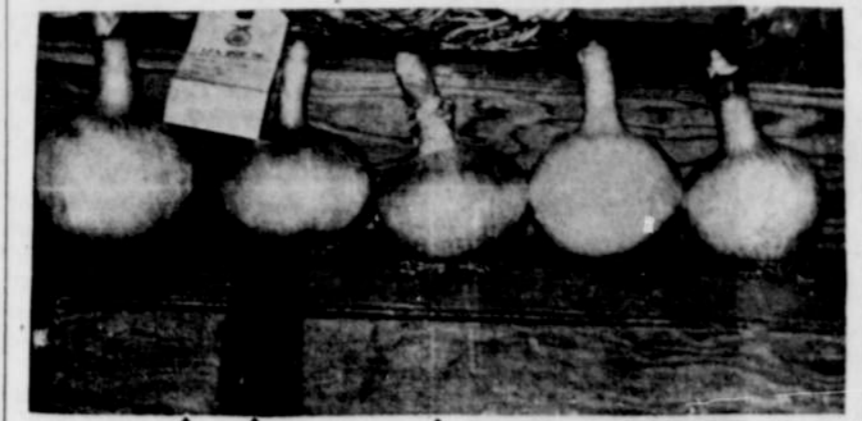

Hearing Rejects 12-Ounce Carton For Butter, Oleo

A 12-ounce carton containing four three-ounce cubes of oleo, all identical in size to the historical 16-ounce carton of four four-ounce cubes of oleo, is deceptive.

After being shown an example of each, unanimous agreement of deception was voted by industry persons at a public hearing in Salem Sept. 5 to consider the state department of agriculture proposal to establish standard weights for butter, margarine and oleo-margarine. Weights established would be at the retail level.

The only change in department proposals was suggestion that a 1 1/2-pound weight unit be omitted. This met ready agreement from the hearings officer, Kenneth E. Carl, chief of the department's dairy and consumer services division.

Carl said later the department expects to draw the regulation prior to Sept. 20.

As amended, the standard net weights proposed would be a quarter pound, half pound, one pound or multiples of one pound. This corresponds to allowable weights in the state of Washington and to the 1958 recommendation of the National Conference of Weights and Measures Officials.

No objections were voiced on the labeling proposals which call for weight to be prominently displayed in legible boldface type and of color that contrasts with the package.
