1963 Beet Acreage To Be Unrestricted, Says Ag Department

Proportionate share will not be established for the 1963 crop of sugar beets, the Department of Agriculture has announced. The decision is being made at this time so that producers and processors may more effectively plan their operations for the next crop year.

According to the ASC County committee, sugar beet proportionate shares are required under the amended Sugar act only when the secretary of agriculture determines that production of sugar from any crop will be greater than the quantity needed to enable the beet sugar area to meet the quota and provide a normal carryover inventory for the area.

Based on probable year-end supplies of beet sugar, the latest Crop Reporting board's estimate of the 1962 sugar beet crop and estimated production from an unrestricted 1963 crop and probable marketing opportunities for the beet sugar area, this situation is not expected to prevail.
