Names Present Problems

Labor has been a problem this year in both plants, and more so since school started, with students returning to classes and mothers quitting to take care of the smaller ones. He said they had transported workers from Caldwell daily and had recruited some from Washington state.

Moss that that he had been critical of the schools in and near Payette for starting the fall terms Sept. 3 when there were crops unharvested and not processed and with a local labor shortage. They could delay the opening a few weeks and be out later in the spring to better advantage.

This would enable the crops to be cared for and give local residents badly needed pay checks. He said the Nyssa plant payroll going out this week was over \$50,000.

Another factor that might be considered by residents of Oregon was taxes, Moss said. With the federal government, as a silent partner, taking 58 percent of all profits in excess of \$25,000, it was becoming more and more important that state and local taxes be held down.

He suggested that it might be well to vote for candidates who might consider a tax cut instead of continually voting for more spending and more controls.
