Good generalship by Gene Jones and drives by Carl Lovitt, Gordon Leavitt, Duff and Skeen carried the ball to the Weiser 18-yard line where a fumble handed the ball to Weiser.

The emergency order was recently released by State Game Director Phil Schneider because of a heavy infestation of suckers and other undesirable fish and plans for chemical treatment.

Schneider says the new limit will be in effect throughout the calendar year.

High School Driver's Training Discussed

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dividual basis this would require 486 hours behind the wheel. It has been necessary, therefore, to schedule driver classes for some students from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. and seven hours of individual instruction on Saturdays.

30 Hours Classroom Required

In addition to the time allotted for "behind the wheel training," each student must have 30 hours of classroom instruction on a number of items pertaining to safe driving. These items involve physical fitness, emotional stability, effects of alcohol on the driver, maturity of a driver, traffic problems and many other phases, a comprehension of which should contribute materially to a young driver's understanding of the problems of safe driving.

The driver training car is purchased from local dealers on a rotating basis. Price paid for the vehicle is cost, plus \$50. After a year's use the car is offered for sale on closed bids. Past experience has shown a total cost to Nyssa taxpayers of about \$250 per year for the car.

The school has used the car for a substitute activity bus when the loads have been small enough, thus saving the larger buses from these runs. It has also been used for groups going to state meetings, such as the Future Farmers, athletic teams, the Press club, the Tupelo staff and various teacher groups attending weekend sessions of various workshop study groups.

Without the use of the driver training car for these trips, the district would have to foot the bills for private cars or deny the students and teachers the benefits of these conferences.

Teacher's Load Increases

State funds will reimburse the district with \$2431 this year for the drivers training course. The district will have to meet the balance of the payments, which, all told, include approximately \$250 for the car, the cost of gas, oil and repairs, and the cost of the teacher's salary. This last item will be higher this year due to increased enrollment.

Previously one-sixth of a teacher's time was devoted to this class. This year it will be somewhat more than one-half of a teacher's load. The amount received from the state will just about cover the teacher's salary, leaving the gas, oil and repairs, plus the car cost of \$250 to the district.

In past years the car has saved taxpayers more money than it has cost because of the multiple use it was given on weekend trips. Such savings will not be possible this year because the training car must be used for its original purpose on Saturdays due to the extremely large class taking the course.

WHILE WRITING obituaries last week for two Nyssa pioneer women, a Journal reporter noted the many coincidences concerning them. The recently deceased ladies, pictured above, are Lira Nellie Sherwood (left) and Clara Ann Beam. They were both born in the month of August. Mrs. Beam was born Aug. 18, 1872, and Mrs. Sherwood on Aug. 4, 1874. They came to Nyssa as brides in 1902 and resided in their original homesites for 60 years.

They were close friends, having lived just across the road from each other on the outskirts of Nyssa during all those years. They both led active lives until ill health forced their retirement. Mrs. Beam was more of a home-body, working in her yard and garden, raising chickens, selling butter and eggs. Mrs. Sherwood, on the other hand, was very active in civic affairs, working with 4-H clubs, the library board and hospital auxiliary. They were both active in church work.

At the time of their deaths, in September 1962, they were each survived by two children and two grandchildren. Both services were conducted at Lienkaemper chapel and interment was made in Nyssa cemetery just four days apart.
