Taylor's Visit in Area Enroute From Legion Meeting in Las Vegas

Col. and Mrs. Taylor had recently attended the American Legion convention in Las Vegas, Nev., and were visiting relatives in Boise and Caldwell. The colonel is a member of President Kennedy's commission having to do with the employment of war disabled, veterans and physically handicapped since 1932. He is currently vice commander of the Richard Garvey, Sr., post No. 393, South San Gabriel, Calif., and also an associate national chaplain.

At the recent National Legion convention in Las Vegas, Taylor presented the Cross of God in the name of the President of the U. S. and the American Legion to retiring national chaplain Rev. Father John Keating of Connecticut.

Taylor, a California Legionnaire, won the highest award in California for rehabilitation in 1962. It is known as the commander's trophy for outstanding rehabilitation work for veterans and their families, presented Oct. 1, 1962, by the Los Angeles county council of American Legion.

Two trophies were awarded—one a perpetuating trophy, the other personally given to Taylor. Thus far including Taylor, only 12 American Legionnaires have won these trophies.
