

Annual Oregon Farm Bureau Session Scheduled Nov 11-14 in La Grande

La Grande will be the scene of the 31st annual convention of the Oregon Farm Bureau federation Nov. 11-14. Headquarters for meetings will be the Sacajawea hotel, where speeches and reports will be heard and luncheons and dinners will be served.

One of the key speakers will be Dr. Ernest Wilkinson, president of Brigham Young university, who will speak at the Monday morning general session on the topic "An Outsider Looks at the Farmer."

Awards Will Be Presented

Other events will include the banquet in honor of recipients of the Distinguished Service to Agriculture award and the 30-Years Service to Agriculture awards on Tuesday, Nov. 13; a panel discussion of tax problems moderated by State Representative George Annala, Hood River, manager of Oregon Tax Research; and a panel Tuesday afternoon concerning natural resources.

Monday afternoon will also be given to an open resolutions session, at which any Farm Bureau member will have the opportunity to discuss pending resolutions.

Additional activities will be the candlelight vesper service at the La Grande First Methodist church Sunday evening when the associate minister of the Walla Walla Central Christian church, the Rev. William Bailey, will speak on the topic "We Are Thankful."

Truckers Roll Up Top Record Miles On Oregon Roads

Oregon's Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill recently reported that truckers had rolled up record mileage on state highways during October, pushing their payments of the weight-mile tax to an all-time high for the month and for the 10 months of 1962.

Hill pegged the state's October take at \$1,702,545, up 4.6 percent over October 1961. He said collections for the 10 months ending Oct. 31 were \$13,814,833, an increase of \$774,007 or 5.94 percent over the same 1961 period.

The PUC turns most of the weight-mile tax money over to the state highway department where it is used to finance repair and construction of highways. The remainder goes toward maintenance of the state police force.
