"Whose Woods These Are" by Michael Frome. A history and guide of the national forests.

"The Home Owner's Tree Book" by John Stuart Martin. A non-technical guide for tree owners which explains the physiology, growth, care and value of trees.

"Just Friends and Brave Enemies" by Robert F. Kennedy. The record of the attorney general's 1962 visit to Japan, Indonesia and Germany with brief stops in Taiwan, Hong Kong, Singapore and Rome.

"Shinto: The Kami Way" by Dr. Sokyō Ono. A simply written exposition of the Shinto belief.

"God, Allah and Ju Ju" by Jack Mendelsohn. Basing his book on travel and interviews, the author considers the future of Christianity, Islam, Communism and native spiritual values in a rapidly growing African self-consciousness.

"Kids, Crime and Chaos" by Roul Tunley. A world report on juvenile delinquency.

"Education and the Common Good" by Philip H. Phenix. The author proposes an educational system whose curriculum would be formed to solve the problems of society. Further he would have this system infused with a concept of value based on worth, not satisfaction; on sacrifice and love, not on the values of the market place.

"A Shade of Difference" by Alven Drury. The author of "Advise and Consent" has taken many of the same characters who lived so robustly in his earlier book and has written a tale of intrigue at the United Nations.

"The Voice of Strangers" by Bob Duncan. A novel concerning a wise and courageous American missionary in Japan.

"Hawaii Pono" by Lawrence H. Fuchs. The 50th state, its people and politics, from annexation to statehood.

"Shaking the Nickel Bush" by Ralph Moody. The author recalls his experiences when, at the age 19, he was told he had only six months to live. In Arizona he made a living first as a cowhand and then as a sculptor.

"Cast a Giant Shadow" by Ted Berkman. The biography of Mickey Marcus, first soldier since Biblical times to hold the rank of general in the army of Israel.

"The Great Iron Trail" by Robert West Howard. An account of the first transcontinental railroad.

"In-Laws and Outlaws" by C. Northcote Parkinson. A jovial guide to success.

"Magnificent Destiny" by Paul I. Wellman. A novel about the great secret adventure of Andrew Jackson and Sam Houston.

"We Have Always Lived in the Castle" by Shirley Jackson. A special, dream-like story of a wealthy family, the outcasts of a hating, fearful New England town.

"Saint Francis" by Nikos Kazantzakis. A historical novel of St. Francis of Assisi.

"Masters of the Desert" by Yaakov Morris. The history of Negev, the southern desert of Israel.

"Life Among the Surrealists" by Matthew Josephson. By definition a memoir this is more nearly a collective biography of the writers and artists who were identified with the surrealist movement in Paris in the 1920's and also of some American writers of the period who chose to remain in New York.

"Democracy's Manifesto" by William O. Douglas. The author advocates the use of radically new policies to deter the spread of international communism in poverty-stricken areas.

"Check - Off" by Jameson G. Campaigne. The author writes on the threat to the freedom of the working man and to free enterprise, as he sees it, because of the domination in several powerful unions of leaders exercising feudal powers and privileges.

"Molders of the Modern Mind" by Robert B. Downs. Consideration of 111 books that shaped Western civilization, along with a brief biographical sketch of the writer, a summary of the content and a discussion of the significance of each.

"An Easy Guide to African Violets" by William L. Meachem. Everything you should know to grow prize-winning plants.

"Barney Oldfield" by William F. Nolan. The life and times of America's legendary speed king.

"Fort Phil Kearny" by Dee Brown. An account of how the Sioux reacted violently to the white man's invasion of their hunting grounds, making the fort Carrington erected in the heart of their territory their chief target.

"The Dried Flower Book" by Nita Cox Carico. A guide to methods and arrangements.

"Folk Dancing" by Richard G. Kraus. Step-by-step details on how to dance over 100 popular folk dances.

"Cibola" by Alice Walworth Graham. A novel of love and hate on a Mississippi river plantation.
