Nov. 13-16 Slated For Bundle Days

School visitors should see classes in action during this week and view present instructional methods in English, biology, chemistry and mathematics. Physical education is taught much differently and with varied equipment, as is spelling, history and dramatics.

American Education Week was first conceived by the American Legion in 1918 to reawaken America to the values of an educated citizenry. Other sponsors of AEW are the National Education association, American Congress of Parents and Teachers and the U.S. Office of Education.

President Issues Proclamation

President John F. Kennedy in his proclamation for this 1962 observance stated:

"I urge all citizens to give special attention during that week to the aims and purposes of education and the programs and problems of our schools and colleges. We should examine the quality of our educational institutions and assess the degree to which our educational programs and practices serve the interests of the individual and bring vitality and strength to our Nation and its culture. Every American should be fully committed to the advancement of education."

City and Hospital Races

New directors for Malheur Memorial hospital district are John Stam, Thomas Drydale and Victor Haburchak. William Willis ran far behind the lowest of the others.

Candidates for the Nyssa city council, with the top four elected, garnered votes as follows:

Cecil Morrison, Jr., 492; Don Engstrom, 413; Ken Pond, 399; Ray Huffman, 397 (new member); Maylin Maxfield (incumbent), 359; Walt Ford, 318; Bob Chate-lain, 204; Orson Leavitt, 175.

Measures and Amendments

All the measures and amendments on the ballot carried state-wide with the exception of numbers 9 and 10. No. 9, to reapportion the state, was defeated by an overwhelming majority. It was quite surprising that 1289 votes were cast against this one in Malheur county, since it was considered so vital to the welfare of Eastern Oregon.

No. 10, to repeal the school district reorganization law, was defeated by a big majority yet carried in Malheur county 2777 to 2472.

Another measure on which voters of the county did not see eye to eye with the state was on daylight savings time (No. 6) since it

Oregon Tourists Increase 31% in 1962; Spend \$217 Million for Record High

Out-of-state visitors traveling in Oregon spent a record-high \$217 million this year, it was announced recently by Forrest Cooper, state highway engineer.

Cooper said a tourist survey conducted by the highway department's Traffic Engineering division shows that 1962 had a 27 percent increase in cars and a 31 percent growth in number of tourists over the previous record year of 1961.

The survey also covered visitors who came by bus, plane and train, each of which indicated a sizable increase.

The survey showed that cars carried 9,255,378 tourists into Oregon, an increase of more than 2,000,000 over the previous year. The Seattle World's Fair was credited with providing a 20 percent increase in the traffic.

Tabulations Show High Figure

Preliminary figures on the survey had indicated that income from out-of-state visitors would be approximately equal to the

was opposed by 2996 votes with 2475 for it. Yet the home county, being in Mountain Time zone, was not to be included under the proposal.

New School Tax Base Defeated

The proposal to increase the tax base from \$329,109 to \$414,230 was defeated by a total of 75 votes. Although all precincts were close, it carried in only Nyssa voting precinct.

1961 total. Final tabulations, however, provided the higher income figure of \$217 million.

The survey was taken at 17 points on major highways at the state's borders. Of the persons interviewed, 61 percent were on their way either to or from the World's Fair. Of this total, 52 percent said they had visited the Oregon travel center at the fair. The travel center was provided by the highway department's Travel Information division.

Spend Less Time in Oregon

Because so many of the state's visitors were on their way to the fair, they spent somewhat less time in Oregon than in previous years, Cooper said. They averaged slightly less than three days each in Oregon, compared to slightly less than four days each last year.

Answers given in the survey indicated the tourists were impressed with their first glimpse of the northwest and that they planned to return on future vacations.

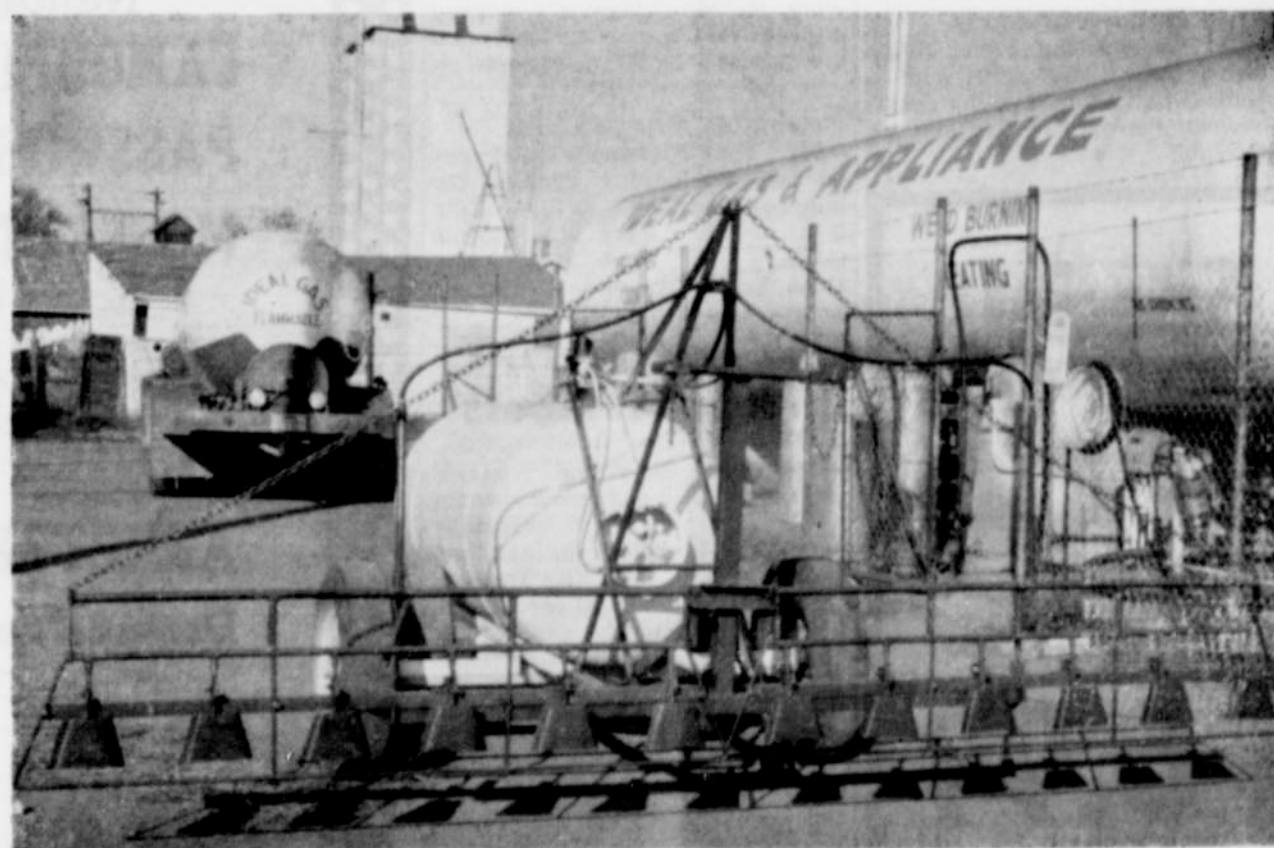
