## Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

WORK SMARER—Standing Head Who spends the most money in your family? Chances are, it's you, the homemaker. As buyer for the whole family you have lots of weighty decisions to make.

To speak for you, a Consumers Advisory council has recently been set up by President Kennedy. It will study consumer problems and advise government officials. Some people feel more should be done to give consumers the kind of information we need to be better buyers.

If homemakers want tips on wise buying of children's clothing, canned goods, carpets, vacuum cleaners, dishwashers, electric ranges, foam rubber upholstery, and many other items, let OSU specialists know—or call the local county extension office.

These specialists at OSU have prepared up-to-date consumer education booklets on these and many other topics. They are free to Oregonians.

ELECTRIC FRY PANS with brown stains on the bottom have baffled many homemakers. When they pour fat from the pan, a little of it probably dribbles down the side. Grease from dishwasher also gets on the bottom, if the pan is dunked after the dishes are washed. The invisible grease film on the bottom of the fry pan turns brown the next time it is heated.

The stain is practically impossible to scour off, but it's easy to prevent. Always wash the pan in clean, hot, sudsy water, rinse well and dry thoroughly. Then there'll be no grease film on the outside.

DOES YOUR WOOD PANELING need sprucing up? The way a neighbor cleans hers may not work for you. How it's cleaned depends on the original finish, we are advised by OSU experts on
