Campaign Manager Explains Unander's Defeat by Sen. Morse

November 10, 1962

To the Editor:

A great deal has been written within the past few days as to why Senator Morse won re-election and Sig Unander lost.

As Sig Unander's campaign director and with access to the highly accurate Waterhouse Poll, I am in a position to analyze the results of the election on a scientific basis. For the record, Senator Morse was no longer Sig Unander's opponent after the Cuban declaration on Oct. 22 by John F. Kennedy. The Senator neither won nor lost an election; he was merely an interested spectator on the sidelines.

The Waterhouse Poll showed that between Oct. 1 and Oct. 22 Sig Unander gained 2 of a point and had cut Senator Morse's lead to 1.1 percent. For all practical purposes, this was a fast horse-race which Senator Morse would have been hard-pressed to win.

However, after the President's strong action on Cuba, which was long overdue, the Waterhouse Poll completely reversed itself and by Nov. 5, Sig was trailing by almost five full points.

Although Sig had long advocated exactly the same actions that the President eventually took on Cuba it was impossible due to lack of campaign funds to project Sig's viewpoint before the President made the Cuban declaration. Therefore, the voters found it easier in this state to identify Cuban action with a Democratic leader than a Republican, and as a consequence Senator Morse was re-elected. In effect, we were "Cubanized."

They left Berryville in 1916 when they moved to Rocky Ford, Colo., and went to Ontario in 1930 from that state.

Among survivors are three sons, Dahl of Nyssa, Herman of Denver, Colo., and Dale of Willow Creek, Calif.; five daughters, Mrs. Eula Coleman of Wecoma Beach, Ore., Mrs. Clara Rasmussen of Milliken, Colo., Mrs. Arvilla Sams of Winnemucca, Nev., Mrs. Helen Davis of The Dalles, Ore., and Mrs. Georgia Mullins of Nyssa.

Missionary Speaker, Dinner Slated Sunday At Christian Church

Kenneth C. Hendricks, retired missionary educator and administrator from Japan, will be guest speaker during the morning worship service Sunday, Nov. 18, at the Nyssa Christian church.

During his Japan stay, Mr. Hendricks was a representative of the Christian churches (Disciples of Christ) through the United Christian Missionary society.

Entering the world mission service in 1921, he and his wife were stationed in Tokyo, Fukushima and Akita and returned to the states in 1932. He then continued to study and served as pastor of several Oregon and Idaho churches before returning to Japan in 1946. He returned to the U.S. in the fall of 1961 to begin his year's terminal furlough and retired June 30, 1962, after 28 years of service.

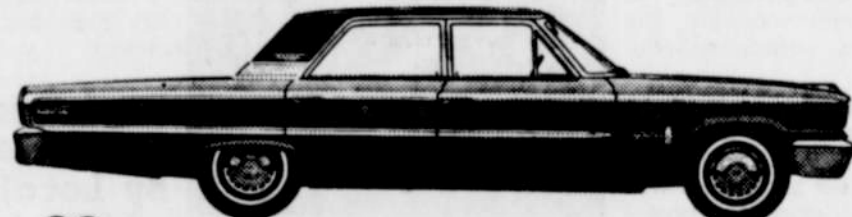
To the People of Malheur County...

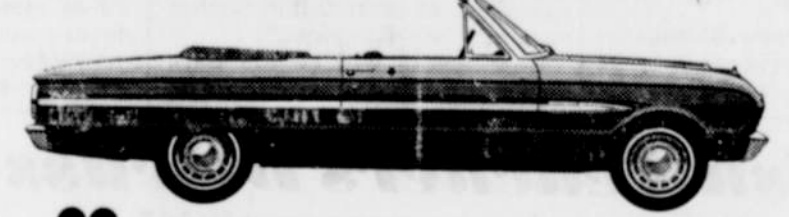
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
