Reader Comments On Senatorial Race

Nyssa Gate City Journal:

In last week's Gate City Journal I noted a letter from Wes Phillips, Sig Unander's campaign manager. Sig Unander is a rich man, so I suppose he can afford to have that letter printed in every weekly newspaper in Oregon, if he feels that way.

Mr. Phillips said, in effect, that President Kennedy's firm declaration of Oct. 22 against Cuban Castro's meanness was what re-elected Wayne Morse as senator. It was not Morse's 18 years of distinguished service in the U. S. Senate. It was not the fact that thousands of voters said, "Yes, I don't like some of the things he says, but who can we get to wear Morse's old shoes?"

It was not because no one ever heard of Sig Unander outside of the Arlington club of Portland, until he became our efficient state treasurer. Oh, no! Just one more rich man in Washington, D.C., wouldn't create a ripple. Millionaires are as common in Washington as pig tracks in a barnyard, but Morse is known from California to Connecticut.

Mr. Phillips knows better than to talk the way he does or he would never have been considered smart enough to be hired as Unander's campaign manager. Mr. Unander did serve Oregon well as the state's hired man, the state treasurer. But he wanted to ride in the bosses' policy-making saddle and that's a different thing.

I note that some politicians are beginning to howl that now the election is over Kennedy is going soft on the Russians. They forget what Theodore Roosevelt taught us—"Walk softly, but carry a big stick."

He did just that thing when he allowed the Russians to plant missile bases in Cuba. Only then could Kennedy move.
