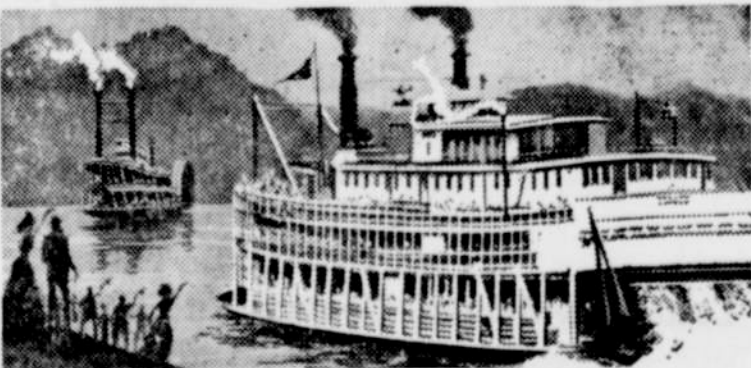
4-H Craft Division Meets

Oregon's cash receipts of \$413 million from farm marketings last year placed her in 31st rank among the states. California was at the top of the ladder with \$3.2 billion and Rhode Island was at the other end with \$21 million.

Washington farm products brought \$566 million as they were sold, to put that state in 24th position. Other western states ranking ahead of Oregon were Idaho, \$425 million, and Arizona, \$467 million.

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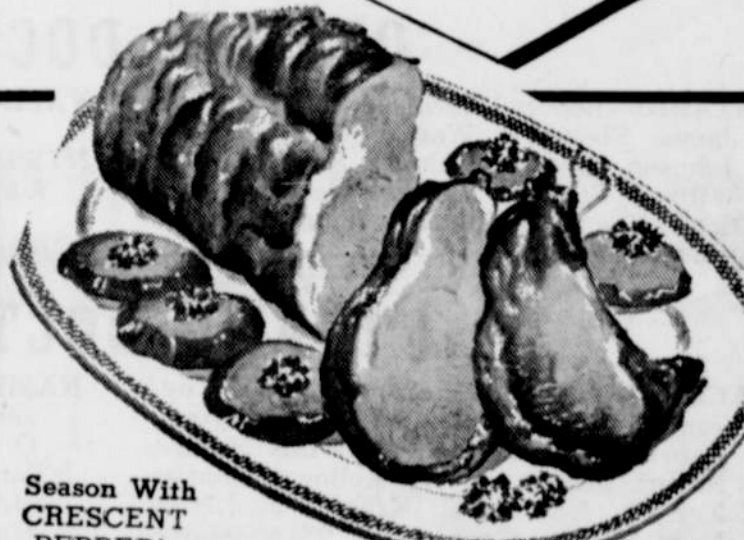
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
