

Chemical Applicators Short Course Scheduled Dec. 17-19 on OSU Campus

Some 360 Oregon licensed chemical applicators will have an opportunity soon to do some cramming for their 1963 state examinations, which will cover the wide field of pesticides.

While attendance is not compulsory, an intensive school for pesticide applicators will be held Dec. 17-19 in Withycombe hall on the Oregon State university campus, announces J. D. Patterson who is in charge of pesticide programs for the state department of agriculture.

Patterson stresses the importance of the school to applicators because for some years only custom users of herbicides (chemical weed killers) were under state license. The last legislature widened the scope to include applicators of all sprays and dusts used to combat pests and diseases of plants and some other pests.

Future Studied in Keynote

Keynoting the three-day course will be the address of Dr. G. F. MacLeod of Fresno, Calif., Niagara Chemical division, on "What's Ahead in the Chemical Industry."

The changing order in pesticide regulation is reflected in the choice of a woman, Mrs. Ruth Scott, Corvallis, to speak for home gardeners in a panel devoted to observations on pesticide uses. Other panelists will be Floyd Mullins, Albany retailer, and Dick Rockhill, Dayton vegetable grower.

On the second morning, pesticides from the aspects of long-term exposure and of immediate exposure will be discussed, respectively, by Dr. William P. Durham, U.S. Public Health Service, Wenatchee, Wash., and Dr. Ralph Sullivan, Oregon State Board of Health, Portland.

To Describe New Developments

R. W. Every, OSU extension entomologist, will relate how pesticide use recommendations are made and OSU entomologists will describe new developments in their field.

Organizational meetings for ground and air operators will wind up the second day.

New developments in various fields of chemical controls will occupy most of the third day, with Oregon State university speakers including Dr. W. R. Furtick, farm crops department; Dr. Garvin Crabtree, horticulture department; Mike Newton, school of forestry; Iain MacSwan, extension pathologist; and Carl Bond, fish and game department.

J. F. Short, director of the state department of agriculture, will conclude the course with a talk on "What's Ahead in Pesticide Uses."

cient and economical transition to a district court system.

"The county court cannot create a district court. But, action at this time, before the first of the year, will certainly save the county several thousand dollars in the transitional stage. It will avoid unnecessary duplication of salaries and expenses of justices of the peace while their six-year terms of office continue until Jan. 1, 1969.

"In the event that the legislature for some reason did not establish a district court, the county court could re-establish the old districts and re-appoint the present incumbents to the positions.

"The bar association of Malheur county strongly recommends the adoption of the district court system. The association urges all citizens, organizations and taxpayers to appear at the public hearing at the courthouse in Vale at 4 p.m. Dec. 5, 1962, and express their opinions to the county court."

Gallagher concluded, "Any lawyer of the county would be glad to appear before any group to explain this proposal."

The Thespian group will have an estimated 25 members by the end of the year according to instructor Don Bates.

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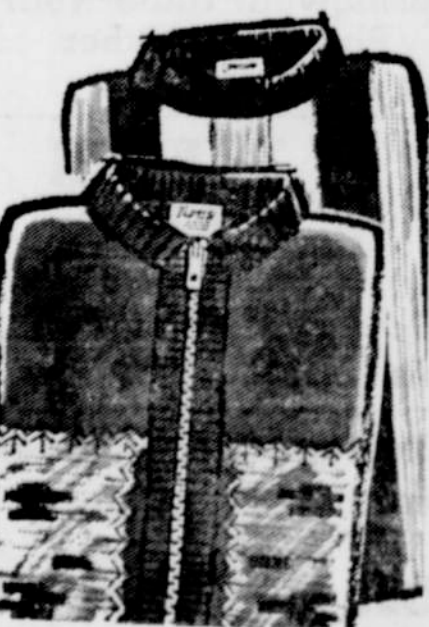
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
