Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

Are you one of those young mothers who feels trapped in a world of little people, day in and day out?

Many say life seems like one round of diaper washing, formula mixing, floor mopping and bathtub scrubbing—plus a 24-hour shift of playground duty.

Mrs. Roberta Frasier, OSU family life specialist advises you to "take heart." Youngsters don't stay little very long. You'll have only about 10 short years out of your married life with small children at home during the day, compared to 30 or 40 years without them.

Honestly now, can't you skip a few of those household chores once in a while during these few years? Must you be a perfectionist in everything?

PRaises FROM YOUR HUSBAND

... will be forthcoming if you practice these ideas for pressing his wool suit. First, make a wool press cloth by sewing a piece of wool fabric about 15 inches by 20 inches to a piece of muslin a mite larger. To avoid shine, always use this, wool side down, when pressing wool garments.

Wrinkles in the upper part of the sleeve can be removed by folding a bath towel to fit inside the shoulder, then press with a steam iron over your wool press cloth.

A fold of paper under the pocket flap will keep the flap from leaving a mark on the coat.

To remove a slight shine, sponge with warm vinegar or ammonia water. Add one tablespoon of either of these (not both) to a quart of water. If this doesn't do the job, rub the surface gently with double-00 sandpaper. Use a swirling motion.

ELECTRIC CAN OPENERS

... are near the top of many gift

lists this year. Here are some shopping tips, in case you're in the market for one. Consider where it will be used—on the wall or work counter. Will it open all cans—pear-shaped, tall, round, square? Is it stable while in use? Some can openers shut off automatically when the can is opened; others are stopped by hand.

Can the cutting knife be cleaned easily? Look for safety features. Some openers are combined with other tools such as a knife sharpener.

If you're a typical homemaker, you spend one year of your life talking on the telephone, according to recent market research. This may be time saving—or not.

To work smarter, you might try this idea from a young Lane county mother. A long cord on her telephone lets her work around the kitchen while she talks.

Two others we know have a telephone coffee break every morning at 10. Each sips coffee by her phone and catches up on the latest happenings. Time limit—15 minutes. A lot less than a neighborhood coffee clatch.

CLEANING FLOORS

... is voted an unpopular job by all of us. Here are some of the questions we get.

"Why is my light gray vinyl turning yellow?" Maybe you're using the wrong wax. Try one of the colorless self-polishing waxes made especially for light floors. And remove it before rewaxing to prevent a build-up of old wax.

"Why is my asphalt tile floor smeary looking?" Are you using a solvent base wax which has to be polished—either a liquid or a paste? The solvent in these waxes softens asphalt. A water-base, self-polishing wax is the right one for asphalt tile. Check the label on the can.

"My floors are always slippery. What's wrong?" Chances are you use too much wax. Two thin coats put on a few hours apart are better than one heavy one. And if

you use wax which needs to be polished, give it a good buffing. It may surprise you to know the more it's buffed, the harder the finish and the less slippery it will be.

Don't use an oil mop on a waxed floor. Oil softens the wax and makes the floor "tacky."

DON'T WORK TOO HARD

... when you wash plastic light fixtures. It's smart to let them air dry. The reason: Rubbing creates static electricity which acts like a magnet to attract dust from the air.

Smart Homemakers Tell Us . . .

When moving heavy furniture, slip a thick pad—several layers of an old towel will do—under each leg. The furniture will slide easily and not mar the floor.
