Range Calf Research Data Reported In Recent Bulletin Released by OSU

A long-range research program aimed at improving winter performance of Eastern Oregon range calves has been summarized in 10-year findings by Oregon State university agricultural experiment station.

Improved feeding practices including use of feed supplements along with meadow hay, value of antibiotics in the feed during the first few weeks following weaning and best dates for weaning calves are among key findings reported by OSU researchers.

Results of trials conducted from 1951 to 1961 at the Squaw Butte Experiment station near Burns are reported in a new OSU bulletin, "Winter Feeding and Management of Range Calves." Oregon residents may obtain free copies of the bulletin from local county agents or the OSU bulletin clerk at Corvallis.

Has Large Application

The 24-page illustrated bulletin was prepared by the Squaw Butte station staff and has application to large areas of the intermountain west where ranchers rely on native flood meadows for winter hay supplies and on sagebrush-bunchgrass ranges for summer grazing.

Good, sound calf-wintering programs are increasingly important to help offset generally higher production costs of raising feeder cattle, the bulletin points out.

Protein Supplement Brings Gains
The bulletin reports how use of phosphorus fertilizer on proper sites in native flood meadows increases yield and quality of hay and boosts calf gains. Use of protein supplement with meadow hay for a wintering ration also has brought marked increase in gains.

The place of pelleted hay in a winter program, comparisons of cottonseed meal and urea as feed supplements, and use of copper supplement with meadow hay are other topics discussed.

Authors of the bulletin are Squaw Butte staff researchers Joe D. Wallace, R. J. Raleigh, Farris Hubbert, Jr., and W. A. Sawyer, station superintendent.

The Rev. Paul Ludlow told the group how the Bible can be effectively used in teaching all ages of children, youth and adults.

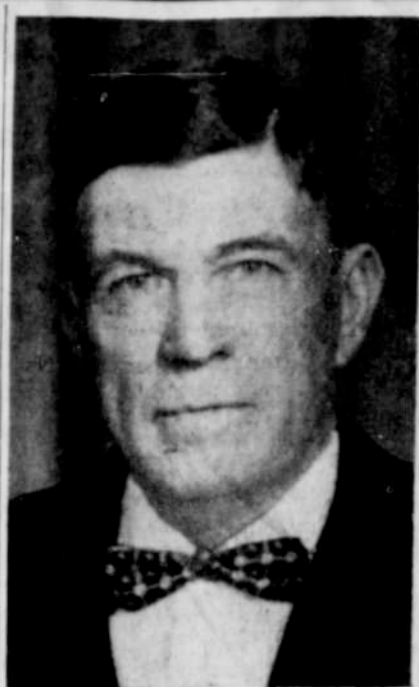
A social hour in the parsonage followed the meeting.

OCE SCHWEIZER Succumbs After Illness

Chapel Rites Held For Lifetime Resident Of Owyhee District

Funeral services for Otto Herbert (Oce) Schweizer were conducted Wednesday afternoon, Dec. 12, 1962, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister was the Rev. Arthur Skogan of Owyhee Community church.

Mr. Schweizer, a lifelong resident of the Owyhee area, succumbed at 10:15 a.m. Sunday at Malheur Memorial hospital, following an extended illness.

He was born Oct. 16, 1893, in the Owyhee community, southwest of Nyssa, a son of Otto T. and Margaret Sinclair Schweizer. He attended Owyhee school.

He was united in marriage on June 1, 1917, to Adah Russell in Weiser, Idaho, and to this union four children were born, all of whom survive. They are Margaret Wood and Lois Elizabeth (Betty) Parker of Nyssa, Stewart Otto (Bud) of Reno, Nev., and Robert William of Burns, Ore.

Mr. Schweizer, a rancher and stockman, was a member of the Owyhee Riding club, Elks lodge and a charter member of the Nyssa American Legion post. His favorite hobby was running wild horses.

In speaking of him, his family and friends have stated that he was a wonderful father, a good and kind neighbor, always willing to help anyone he felt was in need of assistance.

In addition to his widow and children, he is survived by two brothers, George of Ontario and Charles E. of Nyssa; two sisters, Gertrude Jackson of Nampa and Mrs. Emma Householder of Nyssa. Also surviving are seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

A sister, Mrs. Ruth Strickland, succumbed April 20 of this year. Also preceding him in death were his parents; two brothers, John and Fred; and two other sisters, Carrie and Mabel, the latter four having died at early ages.

No services are planned Sunday at the Nyssa church, Pastor Milbrath said.

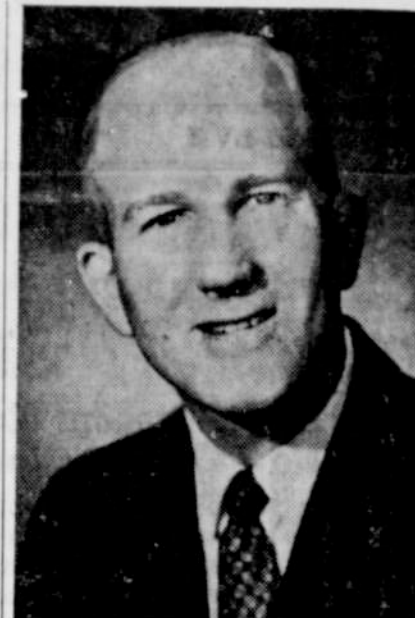
Bazaar Report Given, Study Class Planned By Methodist Ladies
