

### Many Christmas Toys Are Dangerous, Warns Oregon State Board of Health

The Oregon State Board of Health this week urged Oregon adults to select only safe, sensible toys for the children on Christmas to prevent accidents. Accidents are the leading cause of death and injury to children and improperly constructed toys are often the cause of accidents, warns Richard H. Wilcox, M.D., state health officer.

Young children tend to place toys in their mouths, so be alert for toys painted with lead paint. They are a definite hazard because lead poisoning may result. About 60 deaths are caused yearly among children in the United States and many more become seriously ill. Most manufacturers use safe paint on toys. However, if there is any doubt, ask about the paint.

Toys that shoot projectiles are always dangerous. They carry the potential for causing blindness or other serious injuries. The safe use of such gifts should be taught

to children and they should be properly supervised.

#### Dangers Seen in Other Toys

Toys made of plastic are not always as safe as they may appear. Some plastic material is so inflammable that slight contact with a lighted match or cigarette will cause them to burst into flame. Others may break with razor-sharp, jagged edges. Most American toy manufacturers use plastics that do not break easily and are non-inflammable, but watch out for the low-cost imports.

Dolls and stuffed animals with eyes that come out easily should be checked where small children are concerned, because they might swallow them or poke them in their ears or nose. Such eyes should be removed and new ones embroidered in their places.

The Oregon State Board of Health asks that everyone keep safety in mind when selecting toys for children and help assure that this Christmas will be a joyous holiday.

### T. H. Brewer Services To Be Held Today At Chapel in Ontario

Services for Thomas Homer Brewer, Sr., will be conducted at 2 o'clock this afternoon, Dec. 13, 1962, at Bertelson-Lienkaemper chapel in Ontario, under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home of Nyssa.

Mr. Brewer, a resident and farmer of the Owyhee area, succumbed Monday at his home following a brief illness.

He was born Jan. 30, 1885, in Pleasantview, Ill., a son of William H. and Mary Lucinda Easton Brewer. On Dec. 7, 1903, he was united in marriage to Clyda M. Moore at Columbus, Kan. The couple had 10 children, all of whom survive.

The family moved from Buhl, Idaho, in February 1918 to Gannett, Idaho, and in November 1928 moved to a farm north of Ontario. In January 1941, they moved to a farm in the Owyhee area southwest of Nyssa. Mrs. Brewer died Nov. 2, 1946.

Mr. Brewer and Tressa Ditty were united in marriage in 1947.

The deceased was a member of the Assembly of God church. His favorite hobbies were hunting and fishing. He was fond of horses and raised many of them.

In addition to his widow, Mr. Brewer is survived by four sons, Roy of Ontario, Woodrow of Phoenix, Ariz., Homer and Donald of Nyssa; six daughters, Mrs. Eunice Barker and Mrs. Maudrean Evans of Parma, Mrs. Mildred Williams of Nyssa, Mrs. Naomi Westfall of Hines, Mrs. Evalena Penn of Ontario and Mrs. Wilma Tallman of Homedale.

Other survivors include a brother, J. W. Brewer of Buhl; 34 grandchildren and 34 great-grandchildren.

Interment will be made in Rose-dale Memorial park in Payette. Pallbearers will be Mr. Brewer's grandsons.

### Race to Moon, Astronauts' Activities Discussed in New Books at Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, Dec. 15, at Malheur county library include the following:

"America's Race for the Moon" by New York Times. Presented in detail, but in layman's language, is the way we plan to send the first Americans to the moon; what the space ships will be like and how they will operate.

"We Seven" by the Astronauts themselves. The personal, heart-warming and suspenseful story of America's first seven astronauts.

"Mr. Wilson's War" by John Dos Passos. A history of United States covering the years from the assassination of McKinley to the defeat of the League of Nations.

"Foreign Affairs and You" by Andrew Breding. A readable layman's handbook by the former assistant secretary of state for public affairs on all aspects of foreign policy and diplomacy.

"The Yoshida Memoirs" by Shigeru Yoshida. A detailed record by a sometimes un tactful diplomat, five times prime minister of Japan, of his country's blundering into war, beginning with the Manchurian incident in 1931.

"One Clear Call" by Edwin Ryan. A novel that tells the story of a dedicated waterfront priest confronted by his last great challenge.

"Toys in America" by Inez McClintock. A thorough and entertaining history in which toys are related to the society in which they are produced.

"The Toy" by Karl Hils. This book places emphasis on the importance of play in the child's upbringing and is designed for parents, teachers and others who are concerned with the care of young children.

"Life and Energy" by Isaac Asimov. An exploration of the physical and chemical basis of modern biology.

"Parents Ask" by Francis Iig. Two child training specialists at the Gessell Institute of Child Development reprint from their syndicated newspaper column parents' letters with answers to all phases of child behavior problems.

"The Healing of Marriage" by William L. Carrington. A reference manual that is directed primarily to the novice in marriage counseling and is intended to supplement and not supplant professional training.

"How to Keep Fit and Enjoy It" by Warren G. Guild. A step-by-step approach to physical fitness after 30.

"The Family Man" by Sidney Sulkin. The story of Harry Allman, a Jewish immigrant from Russia, and his confusion of values arising from his struggle for financial success.

"The Long Winter" by John Christopher. In this novel of fantasy and suspense, a new ice age is the spur that drives a small group of Englishmen to join the European exodus to the warm lands of Africa and to face there a reversal of the old roles of Black and White.

"Ghost Town Album" by Lambert Florin. The author, with his nostalgic photographs and colorful but accurate stories, takes the reader back over the old trails of the West.

"School for Spies" by J. Bernard Hutton. An ex-communist from Moscow's spy school gives the first complete inside story of how Russia trains men and women for the largest espionage network in the world.

"Federal Censorship: Obscenity in the Mail" by James C. N. Paul. A thorough account of American censorship of the mails.

"Brave New World of Enlightenment" by Louis I. Bredvold. An erudite reminder that faith in science as the potential liberator of human destiny is not the purely contemporary concept generally supposed but has dominated the thoughts of men since the advent of the new learning of the 17th century.

"The Ten Commandments in Modern Perspective" by Owen M. Weatherly. Interpretations of the Ten Commandments for parents, teachers, ministers and laymen.

"Sunny Jim" by Jimmy Breslin. The biography of James Fitzsimmons, one of America's greatest horsemen.

"To Catch an Angel" by Robert Russell. Subtitled "Adventures in the World I Cannot See," this is the autobiography of a man who refused to be imprisoned by his loss of sight.

"Grace Coolidge and Her Era" by Ishbel Ross. A biography of Grace Coolidge from her childhood in New England to her final retirement in North Ampton.

"Her Name Was Sojourner Truth" by Hertha Pauli. The biography of a tall, eloquent, unlettered Negro woman who became a legend as a preacher throughout the East in the mid-19th century.

"A Work of Giants" by Wesley S. Griswold. An account of building the first transcontinental railroad.

"Tom Mboya" by Alan Rake. A biography of a 32-year-old son of an illiterate Luo farm worker who has become one of the best known African political leaders.
