School is fun. I thoroughly enjoy it, but I miss Nyssa very much. I do have lots of new friends here.

Virgil L. Huffman Memorial Rites Held at Madras

Memorial services for Virgil Lee Huffman were conducted at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, Dec. 16, 1962, at the Church of Christ in Madras, Ore., with the Rev. Henry V. Butcher officiating.

Sgt. Huffman, son of Nyssans Mr. and Mrs. Morris Huffman, died Dec. 6, 1962, following a plane crash into the sea near Gibraltar.

He was born April 21, 1931, at Las Animas, Colo., a son of Morris E. and Lenna Morrow Huffman. He attended and was graduated in 1949 from high school in Culver, Ore.

He joined the U.S. Air Force in July 1950, took his basic training at Lackland Air Force base in Texas, special radar mechanics training at Biloxi, Miss., and control tower training at Mather Air Force base in Sacramento, Calif. On June 17, 1951, he was united in marriage to Joy Mildred Burgess at Sacramento.

Beginning in 1954, Sgt. Huffman served one year in Korea and upon his return to the States, was stationed at Mountain Home, Idaho, base until June 1960, when he was sent to Casablanca.

The deceased was a member of the Church of Christ, had been a Boy Scout and held a Red Cross lifeguard service record.

He was very active in civic and church affairs, interested and active in sports. Sgt. Huffman was always congenial to strangers as well as friends and his home was always open to anyone.

In addition to his wife and parents, he is survived by one son, Lonnie; five daughters, Melanie, Rowena, Anita, Tammie and Linda, all of the home; one sister, Mrs. Lois Lundy of Kalispel, Mont., and his grandmother, Mrs. E. O. Huffman of Thompson Falls, Mont.

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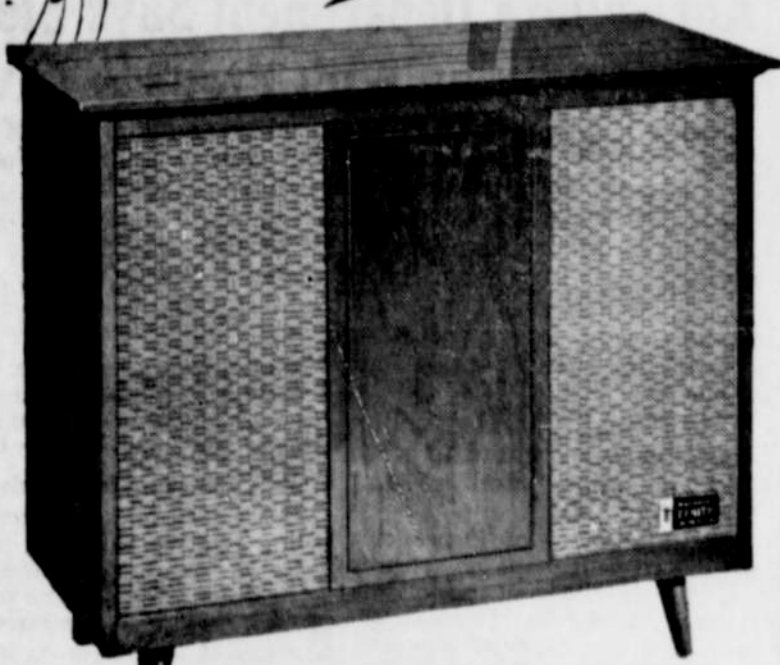
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
