

School Scribe Discusses Background Of Coaches C. Quinowski, J. Bowen

With the 1962-63 basketball season under way, a word here concerning the coaches directing the destiny of this year's squads may be appropriate.

Chick Quinowski, the varsity coach, is at the helm for the second year. He is working the boys hard to develop a team that should carry Nyssa higher in the Snake River conference

than he was able to achieve with last year's squad.

Chick was graduated from Klamath Falls high school where he participated in football and basketball. He took his undergraduate work at Southern Oregon college at Ashland. While at Ashland he gained his first coaching experience with the junior varsity. Later he directed the junior high at Medford, producing an undefeated team in his first year there.

Moving to Madras, Coach Quinowski took over the baseball team, the junior varsity and freshman sports. His freshmen took the Central Oregon championship.

As "Mr. Quinowski," Chick teaches modern problems, family living and geography. The head of the family is Phyllis Quinowski who manages Chick and the two boys—Morty, Calvin—and a daughter, Monica.

Jack Bowen, Native Nyssan

Residents of the Nyssa area don't have to go back far in their memories to recall the high school record of Jack Bowen. He was graduated from Nyssa high in 1951 and besides the diploma, Jack received letters in four major sports.

Boise Junior college took care of Jack's first years of training and he lettered in football. The rest of his undergraduate work was at Oregon State university where he majored in physical education, biological science and lettered in varsity baseball.

Jack's post-graduate work has been taken at the University of Oregon and Idaho. Last summer he attended the first summer of a three-year National Institute study leading to a master's degree in biology at the University of Idaho.

Coach Bowen took his first coaching job in 1958 at Nestucca where he handled varsity baseball. Next year he moved to Westfir where he had charge of all sports. His six-man football teams were twice in the semi-finals of the state playoffs.

Jack has been helping with junior high football, assisting with high school basketball and spring will find him head man on the baseball coaching staff. Three young baseball hopefuls, John, Steven and Kelly, make up Jack's family, with his wife, Vivian, acting as cheerleader.

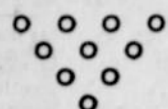
