Oregon Dairymen To Discuss Milk Marketing Law

A last-minute attempt to present a proposed Oregon milk control law to the current legislature will take top ranking at the 69th annual meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's association Jan. 7-9 at Salem.

ODA headquarters will be the Marion hotel with registration beginning Jan. 7 at 2 p.m., announced H. P. Ewalt, Oregon State university dairy specialist and secretary of the association.

Oregon's temporary Milk Stabilization Act of 1961 expired Dec. 31 with the industry still unable to reach agreement on a workable milk marketing program.

Focal point of the ODA meeting is likely to be a new proposed state milk control law slated for consideration Jan. 7 by a special Oregon Dairy Industry committee, Ewalt said. If approved by the committee, the proposal will go to the ODA general assembly and representatives of the Oregon Milk Producers association with hope of getting it before the 1963 state legislature.

The special committee drafting the proposal represents 25 organized producer groups in Oregon and about 75 to 80 percent of all milk produced. Frank Rood, Coos Bay, is chairman of both the committee and ODA; and Clarence Chapman, Oregon City, is president of the Milk Producers association.

Key speakers who will help examine the market situation are Dr. Harold Hollands, OSU agricultural economist, and Gordon Reuhl, Modesto, Calif., western regional director of the American Dairymen's association.

Dr. Hollands will discuss basic principles of marketing and the responsibilities of producers for marketing their product. Reuhl will review needed cooperation within the dairy industry to obtain a statewide marketing program.

Milk Production for 1962 in Oregon Drops to Lowest Level in 37 Years

Milk production in Oregon during 1962 dropped to the lowest level in 37 years, principally because of the decline in the number of dairy farms and total number of milk cows, reports Stephen C. Marks, Oregon State university agricultural economist.

With December's milk production still to be recorded, the state's milk output during the first 11 months of 1962 stood at 1 billion 18 million pounds, down 31 million pounds from the same months in 1961, he noted. Total production for the year is sure to be less than 1.1 billion pounds for the first time since 1925.

In 1925, Oregon dairymen produced 1 billion 47 million pounds of milk. Production went up steadily until 1942 when it peaked at nearly 1.5 billion pounds. Since then, the trend has been downward in all but five of the last 20 years, the economist pointed out.

Credit corporation, Marks noted. Beginning in April, CCC had purchased in excess of 1 billion pounds of non-fat dry milk through Dec. 5. In the same period, it bought nearly 218 million pounds of butter and some 136 million pounds of cheese.

Much of these products have already been disposed of by sales, transfers and donations, but government inventories still are much heavier than a year earlier, he pointed out.
