Oregon Adopts Federal Pesticide Residue Tolerance

Federal regulations governing pesticide residues on raw agricultural products will become Oregon's regulations also on Jan. 25.

Director J. F. Short of the state department of agriculture signed an order to this effect Jan. 4. The order followed a hearing Dec. 28 in which adoption of the federal tolerances as Oregon's requirements was at issue—except no issue developed, as no one offered testimony either for or against at the hearing.

Federal pesticide residue tolerances prevail on raw agricultural products that move in interstate commerce. For this reason, federal tolerances are rather uniformly used by the various states.

Moreover, J. D. Patterson, SDA's chief chemist, points out that the financial outlay for investigations and studies at the state level would be extremely costly and time consuming. This seemed unnecessary in view of the fact that Oregon investigations presumably would come up with the same results the federal government found and uses in establishing its tolerances.

Because changes occur rather rapidly in this field, the department anticipates it will need to hold periodic hearings to review the tolerances.

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NOTICE OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENT Street Improvement District No. 6

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that pursuant to Ordinance No. 413 passed and adopted by the City Council of the City of Nyssa, Malheur County, Oregon, on the 11th day of December, 1962, there has been levied and assessed against the property in Street Improvement District No. 6 for the improvement of certain streets in the City of Nyssa to serve the areas within said Street Improvement District No. 6 the sums and amounts hereinafter set forth. Said assessments have been made, as directed by said Ordinance, and entered on the record in the City Lien Docket, and the same are now due and must be paid on or before the 14th day of January, 1963, unless written application is filed with the City Recorder of the City of Nyssa within ten days of the date hereof to pay said assessments in installments. That said assessments are a lien against the following described real property in the amounts set forth against each thereof.

In the event the sum assessed against any lot or parcel thereof is not wholly paid to the City Recorder of the City of Nyssa or application filed with said City Recorder for the payment of said assessment in installments, as provided by the laws of the State of Oregon, said sum or amount so assessed against any said lots or parcel respectively shall be deemed delinquent and the City Council may, at any time thereafter, enforce the collection thereof by foreclosure in the manner provided in the Charter and Ordinances of said City of Nyssa and the statutes of the State of Oregon.

ASSESSMENT ROLL STREET IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 6 CITY OF NYSSA, MALHEUR COUNTY, OREGON

BE IT REMEMBERED, that pursuant to Ordinance No. 413 adopted by the City Council of the City of Nyssa, Malheur County, Oregon, on the 11th day of December, 1962, providing for the improvement of certain streets in the City of Nyssa, as follows, to-wit:

South Eighth Street from the South line of King Avenue to the North line of Thompson Avenue, South Seventh Street from the South line of King Avenue to the North line of Thompson Avenue, South Sixth Street from the South line of Good Avenue to the North line of Reece Avenue, Emison Avenue from the West line of Fourth Street to the East line of Sixth Street, Emison Avenue from the West line of Seventh Street to the East line of North Main Street, North Seventh Street from the North line of Park Avenue a distance of 436 feet to and including the centerline of vacated Maple Avenue, North Sixth Street from the North line of Park Avenue to the South line of Walnut Avenue, North Fifth Street from the North line of Park Avenue to the North line of Maple Avenue, Maple Avenue from the West line of Third Street to the East line of Fourth Street, Maple Avenue from the West line of Fourth Street to the East line of Fifth Street, excluding all street and alley intersections and half of a certain street abutting upon real property owned by the City, which intersections and portion of street shall not be included for the purposes of assessment against the benefited properties:

and after the expiration of the time for filing protests and remonstrances against the improvement of said streets set for the 11th day of September, 1962, at 8:00 o'clock p.m. of said day, the City Manager of said City of Nyssa proceeded to and did ascertain as nearly as possible the cost of said street improvements according to the estimates of the City Engineer who was directed by the City Council to prepare and submit such estimate, and he did apportion and assess the sum against each lot or parcel of land thereto and included in said Street Improvement District as determined and established by said Ordinance, and the following list or record containing the name of each land owner in said District according to the records of Malheur County, Oregon, and the description of each piece of property within said District and the total cost of such improvement applicable thereto is hereby submitted as and for the assessment roll for said improvement, to-wit:
