Wolverines Down Bulldogs 66-41 In Saturday Tilt

Saturday night the Nyssa hoop teams journey to Weiser for a return engagement with a squad that had treated them to a rather disastrous evening in the Nyssa gym last Dec. 18. Nyssa got off to a much better start in this second encounter but the final result was approximately the same as the smooth Weiser outfit poured in a 66-point score to 41 for the Bulldogs.

Scoring for Nyssa was a little more evenly divided in this fray, although Jerry Willson led his teammates with 10 points. Doug Skeen got into the scoring column as he and Brent Schulthies both accounted for six points apiece. Jim Kodama, Greg Duff, John Beck, Mike Jefferies, Clay Hiatt and Chris Wyckoff all got points as Coach Chick Quinowski cleared his bench to give the boys some experience.

Terry Thompson was outstanding on the backboards, closely followed by Duff and Schulthies. Weiser was a particularly aggressive outfit, stealing the ball an unusual number of times from Bulldog players who are adept at ball control. Percentage of shots made by the Nyssa squad was very low for this time of the season.

The junior varsity came a little closer to making a game of it—although it must be remembered that Nyssa beat the Junior Wolverines when they played at Nyssa. The final score was 47-39 in favor of Weiser.

Bob Palmer was high point man for Nyssa with 13, followed by Alan Cottle with 10 counters.

These two lads also led their team in taking rebounds off the backboards. There were 16 missed free throws by the Bulldogs which is far more than this squad usually blows. This may account for their downfall.

Next week the Nyssa squad plays host to Payette here on Friday, Jan. 11, and Parma here Saturday, Jan. 12.

Last week Payette fell to Vale by a score of 51-44 and Parma was defeated by the Ontario Tigers 53-40.
