

Nyssa Bulldogs Down Payette 52-45, Parma 58-52 in Weekend Hoop Action

The Bulldogs of Nyssa scored a victory over the visiting Pirates from Payette Friday, Jan. 11. It was their second win against two losses in conference play. The Nyssa five had previously defeated Meridian while losing two games to the Weiser Wolverines.

The Pirates and Bulldogs fought on even terms for the first five minutes of the game, tying the score at six all. At this point Brent Schulthies and Greg Duff got the range and Nyssa widened the gap 16-10 at the end of the first quarter.

Jerry Willson and Brent Schulthies led the scoring for Nyssa with 16 points apiece. Terry Thompson picked up 11, Jim Kodama 7 and Doug Skeen dropped in a free throw to complete the Bulldog scoring.

High point men for Parma were Gould and Watts with 13 points each.

The junior varsity boys also won their game by a close margin, 42-40. Coach Jack Bowen's charges were behind at the end of the first quarter and had the lead at the end of the half. They were behind at the end of the third frame but managed a two-point lead as the horn sounded.

Robert Palmer was high for the Bulldogs with 12 counters, followed by Gerald Wyckoff with 10.

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and display room is practically non-existent. Five sections of biology students use this one room. As a recitation room it is sufficient, but as recitation room plus laboratory it is not sufficient.

Year after next, the present biology room will be needed for additional classes of general science that are now meeting in the physics and chemistry lab. At the present time we have only makeshift biology laboratory facilities. There is little storage space for laboratory equipment.

Would Alleviate Problems

If the biology department could be moved to the old ag room, the chemistry and physics, now housed and limited to the one chemistry room, could spread out into the room vacated by the biology classes. Three sections of general science could also be accommodated in a much more satisfactory manner by the science teachers.

It must be remembered that we have gone from a student body of 325 to 400 in a matter of five years. We have known for some time that when these large classes
