The Rev. Joe Wagnon, pastor of the First Christian church in Weiser, Idaho, will be guest evangelist for the services beginning each evening at 8 o'clock.

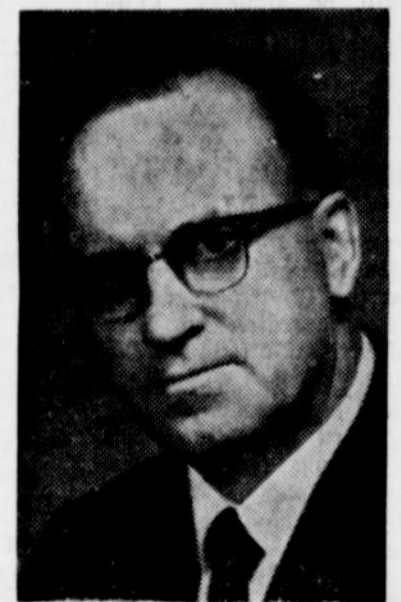
