in which he serves. Therefore, whether it be good or bad, his conscience is affected by the results.

There is no question that one of the first decisions we will be asked to face is that of our own salaries. A bipartisan committee has suggested that a per diem of \$20 per day and a salary of \$250 per month be adopted. The total per biennium then would be \$8,400. Add to this \$2,040 which many legislators receive whose wives work as their secretaries. The total then is \$10,440 per biennium.

**Believes Amount Excessive**  
While I do believe that legislators' expenses should be met, I consider this recommendation to be outrageous and excessive. No conscientious elected official could vote for this measure, especially because of the existing economic condition of the state and the need in areas such as education and institutional building.

Senator Ben Musa was elected president of the Senate and Representative Clarence Barton, speaker of the House. Both are strong-minded individuals who have definite and adamant beliefs concerning taxation. No doubt this will result in strife and controversy between the House and Senate on a most important issue—taxation.

Speculation suggests a 150-day session. However, many are hopeful that the length of the session might be reduced substantially by cooperation and hard work.
