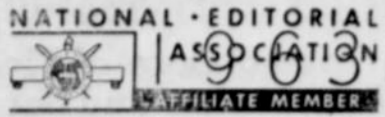

Dear Sirs:

I read today where Senator McNamara of Michigan wanted to give six towns of his state, government-constructed, taxpayer-financed post offices and not just ordinary post offices either. Look at population and proposed cost of each town.

Lake Linden, population 1314, \$174,000; Lawton, 1402, \$173,000; Port Austin, 706, \$174,300; Mancelona, 1141, \$174,300; Roscommon, 867, \$181,200; Crosswell, 1800, \$177,000.

Now this was a real opportunity for these towns (even though they themselves could hardly afford the upkeep and interest costs of buildings that size) but surely they were going to get a healthy share of their money back from Washington (as we are being told by those who are asking for this government money in Malheur county and cities of Ontario, Vale and Nyssa).

But did they, the people of these towns in Michigan, want this government money? Listen to what Carl D. Black, editor of Sanilac County (Mich.) Jeffersonian, had to say:

"Believe me, Senator, it's not that we wouldn't like a new \$177,000 building in town. It's just that we keep remembering where that \$177,000 comes from, and we have a nagging feeling in the area of our billfold that that money will have to be replaced from the same source. So please, Senator, take us off your gift list."

The people then rallied around this editor and wrote their benevolent Senator and the post offices were forgotten.

In my opinion, we are just not pigs enough in Malheur county to get in this government trough and get our share. Then why should we contribute to the very thing that is apt to cause the greatest nation ever known to man to fall into bankruptcy and failure?

I'm sure the money asked for is rightly ours but we should remember that as long as there are citizens willing to accept unnecessary government spending, especially in their areas, there will always be politicians too weak to say no.

Maybe what we want the money for is necessary. If so, let's find out the cost, put it to the people in an election and see if they want it badly enough to pay for it or not.

Violet Grunke Dies After Sudden Attack; Rites Held Monday

Funeral services for Violet Louella Grunke were conducted Monday afternoon, Feb. 4, 1963, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Wallace Prowell of Nyssa Christian church officiating.

She succumbed Friday in Holy Rosary hospital at Ontario. She suffered a cerebral hemorrhage as she was leaving work last Thursday at Ore-Ida Foods company. She was rushed to the hospital where she remained, without gaining consciousness, until her death.

Mrs. Grunke was born Aug. 15, 1907, near West Union, Neb., a daughter of Earl and Nora Drake Mehrhof. She was united in marriage on April 28, 1930, to Carl W. Grunke at Hot Springs, S.D.

They resided in the Midwest until coming to Nyssa in 1942.

Mrs. Grunke was a member of the Christian church and worked extensively with Girl Scout troops in the community.

In addition to Mr. Grunke of the home, she is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Jack (Patricia) Simpson of rural Nyssa and two granddaughters, Karla and Tonya Simpson.

Other survivors include her mother of Wichita, Kan.; two brothers, William and Carl of Alta, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Bonnie Gibson of Wichita and Mrs. Mary Hlavka of Sturgis, S.D. Her father succumbed in 1942.

The "Penny Parade" traditionally takes place during the month of February. Sometime during the month, a pair of ward Primary officers or teachers parade to doors to receive contributions.

The Primary Children's hospital is a non-profit corporation and is operated by a board of trustees. They appoint the medical staff chosen from the finest specialists available. Many kind doctors have given liberally of their time and talents without charge to help the small patients.

All Children Accepted
Any child under 14 years of age, regardless of color, creed or race, is welcome at the institution with exception of children who need custodial care only.

Anyone who desires to know more of this service may contact me, Nyssa state Primary president; Mrs. Melvin J. Feik or Mrs. Clifton D. Anderson, presidents of the two Nyssa ward Primaries. The chief resident of the hospital will be contacted by phone if the case is an emergency.
