

Books Dealing With Present Problems In Africa Head List at County Library

"The Lonely African" by Colin M. Turnbull. The author brings home to the reader the tragedy of the present-day African, caught between the old and new, by using the first-person stories of people from an eastern Congo village where life has changed and not for the better.

"Through African Doors" by Janheinz Jahn. A study of African culture based on first hand experience.

"Africa and the West" by Arnold Rivkin. The director of the Center for International Studies at Massachusetts Institute of Technology summarizes the results of his four years of research on African economics and political development.

"The Atom: Friend or Foe?" by Charles-Noel Martin. An explanation of atomic theory, which includes a table of elements and atoms and a brief glossary, precedes the author's outline of the possibilities of peaceful use of nuclear physics.

"Living With the Atom" by Ritchie Calder. An interpretation of the peacetime uses of nuclear energy and their effects upon public health.

"Man Against Pain" by Bernard Seaman. A history of man's attempt to relieve human suffering.

"The Small Needle of Dr. Large" by John Ellis Large. An Episcopal clergyman's short, pithy and humorous homilies originally written for a parish newspaper.

"Seeds of Hope in the Modern World" by Barry Ulanov. Scholarly essays on the refreshment to be drawn from the thinking of modern scientists, scholars and artists.

"The Pasternak Affair" by Robert Conquest. A documentary report that offers readers a full account of the controversial Pasternak case which began with the publication of "Dr. Zhivago" and ended with his death in disgrace.

"Cross Fire" by Ezra Taft Benson. A record of the harsh political realities of 1952-60 and of what happens to a man and his family when they go to Washington.

"The Sand Pebbles" by Richard McKenna. The story of the sailors who manned an ancient U.S. gunboat in Hunan Province, China, during the Kuomintang revolution of 1925-27.

"Kings of the Home Run" by Arthur Daley. A review of 20 outstanding baseball hitters — their personalities, development and triumphs.

"Seven Days in May" by Fletcher Knebel. The story, set against a political background, is about a military plot to take over the government.

"No Parade for Mrs. Greenla" by Anne Miller Downes. A quiet story that takes place in a rundown neighborhood in a small city in upstate New York. The hero is Alex Trumbull, an orphan brought up by a loving and understanding aunt.

"A Study of Communism" by J. Edgar Hoover. Mr. Hoover traces the history of Communism and discusses the forces behind the Communist threat to America.

"Troublemakers" by Raphael Joseph Feiwel. This sociological but informal study examines British juvenile delinquency in its postwar social setting and also comments on the same problem on the continent, in the U.S. and in the Soviet Union.

"The Future of Federalism" by Nelson A. Rockefeller. Given at Harvard university in 1962, these Godkin lectures develop the relationship between federalism and freedom, nationalism and a free world order.

"Walk Together, Talk Together" by Katharine T. Kinkead. An enthusiastic survey of the student exchange program.

"Fighter Pilot" edited by Stanley M. Ulanoff. A comprehensive history of military aviation.

"The Odd Day" by De Witt Copp. The Chinese Communists announced in 1958 that they would shell the islands of Quemoy and Matsu on every odd day of the month. The author interviewed 150 men and women on the islands and on Formosa to gather a picture of an odd day.

"The Broken Spears" edited by Miguel Leon-Portilla. Inspired editing of Cortez' conquest of Mexico in 1519-21 makes this an unusual and touchingly human book.

"The Last Portage" by Walter O'Meara. The biography of John Tanner who was captured by the Shawnees in 1789 and spent 30 years with them.

"The First Heretic" by Fred Gladstone Bratton. A professor of religious history and literature offers what is perhaps an idealized portrait of an ancient Pharaoh.

"Hurricane Fighters" by Pauline B. Innis. Jack Farren determined to lick his fear of storms by joining the Navy's famed Early Warning Hurricane squadron. The story of his experiences is

Sen. Yturri, Rep. Smith Introduce Measure To Label Legislation

I am mailing copies of all bills introduced in the legislature to Dennis Fuller, county clerk in Baker; Clerk Homer Schnell and Judge Jeff Dorroh in Vale; Hap Logue, Ontario; Don Filteau, Burns; John Liveira, Canyon City; and Gene Stunz, Nyssa. Persons interested will be able to obtain any bill they desire from these sources.

Elmer McClure, former master of the Oregon State Grange, introduced a memorial to change the name of the John Day Dam to "Franklin D. Roosevelt Dam." Despite our testimony in opposition, the committee passed out the bill with a "do pass" recommendation. However, I am confident that it will not pass both houses.

Suggests Interlocutory Decree

Several bills have been introduced to abolish the death penalty and one to shorten the time within which a divorced person can remarry from six months to 30 days after the decree is entered. It appears to me that an interlocutory decree is the only answer to the rapidly mounting divorce rates and I testified to this effect yesterday before the Judiciary committee.

The eastern Oregon delegation met with the state forester and his staff yesterday in order to lighten the burden of the assessment for fire protection of grazing lands. The assessments for the 1962-63 year, in many cases, were three times that of previous years. We learned of the processes that are used in levying such assessments, some of which are inequitable in my opinion.

We believe that a solution has been reached which will place a positive maximum amount per acre which can be assessed in any one year. While this is not final, it appears that the ceiling for grazing lands will be somewhere between five and seven cents per acre.

Despite the claims of newspapers, this session is progressing more slowly than those of the past. Nevertheless, I do not believe that it will exceed the 128 days of the 1959 session.
