Next meeting will be March 4 at the home of Mrs. Ira W. Price.

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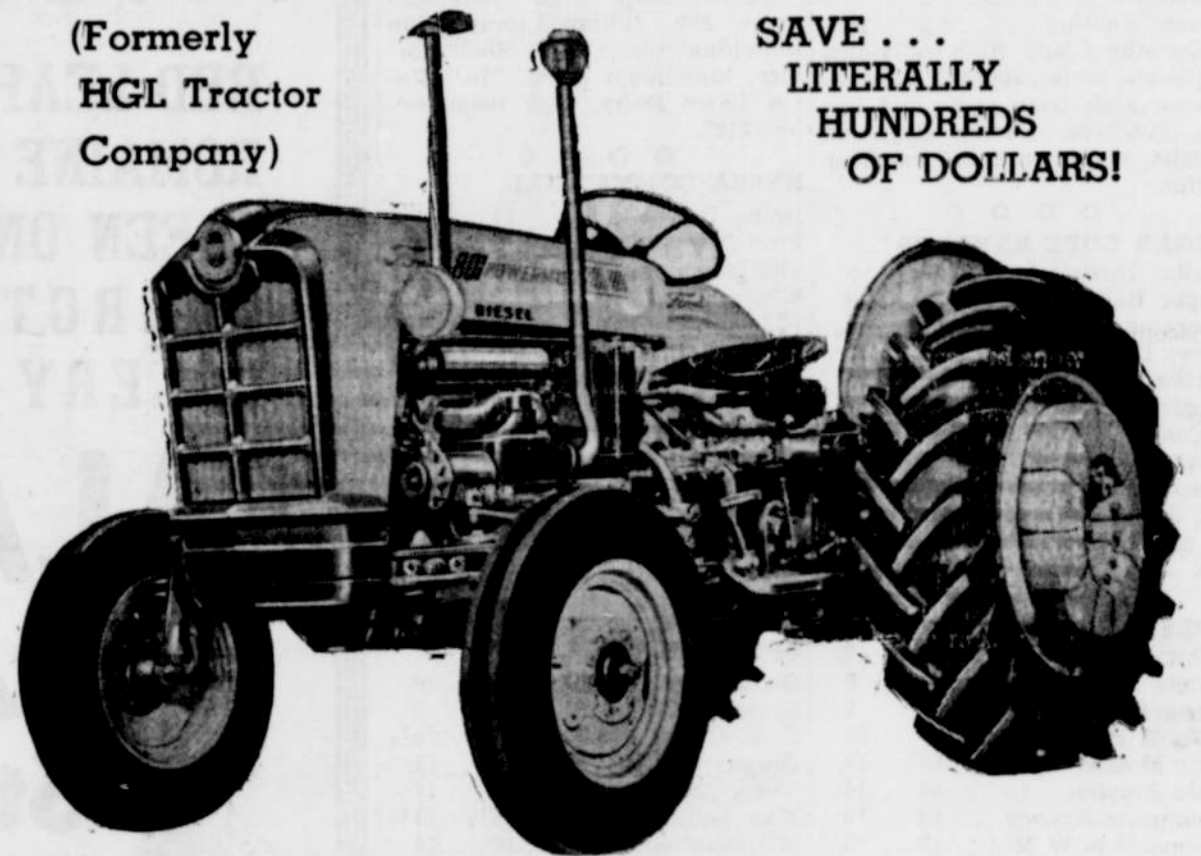
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
