At halftime their lead increased to 34-15; the third quarter, 46-22. The Bulldogs didn't quit as attested by the fact that Brent Schulthies, Terry Thompson and Greg Duff were retired via the five personal foul route. Jim Benedict and Jim Kodama each had four personals and Doug Skeen had three.

Emmett dominated the backboards and smothered most of the Bulldog attempts to get inside for a closeup shot. Hence the Nyssa attack resolved itself into an outside shooting match, not many of which connected.

Thompson and Skeen were high point men for Nyssa with five points apiece. Willson and Kodama tied for second honors with four apiece; Benedict, Duff and Christy Wyckoff picked up a basket each. Haney and Schulthies tallied with free throws for their part of the total.
