

Booklet Praises Oregon Products, Resources; Author Predicts Great Economic Growth in Next 10 Years

Well-Known Consultant Sees California, Other Western States as Consumer Markets

Oregon, with its world-wide reputation for quality products, is destined to grow amazingly in population and industrial development in this decade and in the next 25 years.

The prediction of Hubert J. Soher, nationally-recognized consultant of San Francisco, is the conclusion of a newly published survey-report on Oregon's economy, titled "Oregon Today and Tomorrow, An Economic Study of the Quality State."

The result of a year's study, the report has been published by Pacific Power & Light company in the form of a 60-page book. It will be widely distributed in Oregon and the nation.

"Oregon is entering its most dynamic period of growth," Soher says in the summary and concluding chapter of his 25,000-word illustrated report, which is based upon hundreds of personal interviews with leading industrialists, financiers, educators, federal and Oregon agencies, local officials, editors, chambers of commerce, labor leaders and agriculturalists.

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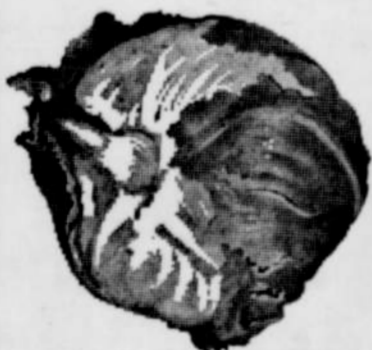
