

### City Librarian Reviews New Books Recently Added to Public Library

City Librarian Joy Bell announces that the following new books have recently been added for circulation at Nyssa public library:

#### ADULT READING

**"The Pyramid Climbers"** by Vance Packard. In a nation where huge corporations are becoming more and more important, where increasing numbers of young men are committing their lives (and some say, their souls) to business institutions and where executives are considered social models, if not heroes, Mr. Packard's book is disquieting, to say the least. It is also deeply pondered and fascinating.

**"Practical Law"** by Warren Lehman. Most people unwittingly live on the brink of aggravating, time-consuming and costly legal problems. This Tutor-Text, by using case histories, teaches you what you need to know to stay out of the lawyer's office or the courtroom by explaining the ins and outs of the many legal and contractual problems which surround you.

**"O My America!"** by T. S. Matthews. The subtitle of this book is "Notes on a Trip." The trip is transcontinental and it took place recently, seven years after the author had taken up residence in England. Its purpose was to get a fresh look at his native land.

**"The Golden Rendezvous"** by Alistair MacLean. Both the "Twister," a deadly new atomic weapon, and Dr. Slingsby Caroline, director of a top-secret research laboratory have mysteriously vanished. As the Campari steams north, strange things begin to happen—a crewman's disappearance . . . three murders in 24 hours . . . and sabotage.

**"Book Reviewing for an Audience"** by Evelyn Oppenheimer. Here, at last, is a practical guide which will enable not only the beginner but the more experienced speaker as well, to give informative and entertaining book reviews.

**"Parents Ask"** by Frances L. Hig, M.D. The authors have collected in "Parents Ask" many of the letters they have received over the years from parents concerned with the problems of child behavior. Here are the difficulties which trouble the majority of parents.

#### SPEND SUNDAY IN BOISE

**"Travels With Charley"** by John Steinbeck. Again, as always, Steinbeck's concern was with the people. As the small villages, the vast spaces, towering mountains and laughing meadows unrolled before the indomitable Rocinante, her owner, aided and cheered by Charley, looked for the American identity. Never before have people and country been examined and reported with so much love combined with so much critical insight.

**"Help Your Children Prepare for College"** by Jean Wellington. Helpful discussions are included on college selection and admission and how to budget for and finance a higher education. At all times the authors emphasize their belief that no matter what kind of school or teaching children may be exposed to, they can be helped to a good education by their parents.

**"The Sand Pebbles"** by Richard McKenna. This is the story of a country in torment, of believable men and women torn by old loyalties and new values in alien surroundings, vividly brought to life. It is a story of violence and humor and tenderness and tragedy and courage, and it holds the reader engrossed and involved from the first line to the last.

**"The Inheritor"** by R. C. Hutchinson. When a mysterious benefactor dies, naming him his heir, Vincent makes his way to England, convinced he is on his father's track and determined to learn what, besides money, he has inherited. There he meets the cousins who are contesting the will, and there he begins to recognize his own nature as the image of his father emerges from clouds of secrecy and scandalous innuendo. As Vincent battles toward the light, its dark intensity grips and holds the reader.

**"The Whistling Sword"** by Robert James Green. Basil St. Leonard was thousands of miles from his native Antioch, a trusted scribe of the terrible Genghis Khan, ruthless ruler of the Mongol hordes. Basil's father was an English crusader, his mother a beautiful Syrian. His chief purpose was to find his mother and avenge the death of his grandfather.

**"On Growing Up"** by Herbert Hoover. Here is a book that will delight and surprise the reader. For nearly half a century Herbert Hoover has been carrying on a private correspondence filled with wit and wisdom. His letters, however, do no good to the great statesmen of the world but to the boys and girls from all over America who write the 31st President seeking advice and information.

**"The Polly Bergen Book of Beauty, Fashion and Charm."** The first and most important step to becoming beautiful is to want to be beautiful as yourself. No! Don't buy a dress. Read how these simple rules have helped her—and discover how they can help you.

**"The World of the White-Tailed Deer"** by Leonard Lee Rue III.

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
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
