course other than to vote against the submission of the Constitution for a vote of the people. Eastern Oregon area has been "gypped" enough already.

Bitterness Over Civil Defense

A great hue and cry and considerable bitterness have resulted from a reported intention of the Ways and Means committee to virtually abolish the Civil Defense agency in Oregon. The governor complained of this treatment and said so openly. Several Democratic senators took to the floor to castigate the governor for his frank statements.

What the outcome will be is not certain but it does seem strange that the Department of Defense of the United States is spending millions on Civil Defense while many in Oregon claim that the agency should be abolished because it is doing little good. Some of the local county directors of Civil Defense have informed me that it is performing a service in that it is bringing about an awareness on the part of the citizenry to the effects of a devastating foreign attack.

We are told that fallout shelters that will accommodate nearly a million people have been provided and that at least there is provision to inform the people how to defend themselves. From the standpoint of principle, Oregon would be going directly against the President and the Defense department if the legislature abolishes Civil Defense.

It would seem to me that a more logical approach would be to correct the weaknesses we feel exist in the agency—but not to abandon the policy or principle involved.

Council for Aging Discussed
There is talk to the effect that the Council for the Aging may be abolished because the budget for this agency is \$57,000. It seems to me that the aged people of our state are among those whose interests have been neglected. The number of older people is constantly increasing due to increased longevity.

Instead of abandoning their interests, perhaps we should concentrate upon them more intensely in order to keep them working and useful with a sense of pride in themselves. What we do now—even at little cost—may spare the people many serious problems in the future.

Tax Possibilities Noted
The second round of joint committee meetings on taxation has been completed. The majority sentiment in the committees seems to be:

1. Eliminate the federal income tax deduction.
2. Retain split-income privileges, and
3. Retain charitable contributions, home taxes, non-business interest as deductions in preparing income tax returns.

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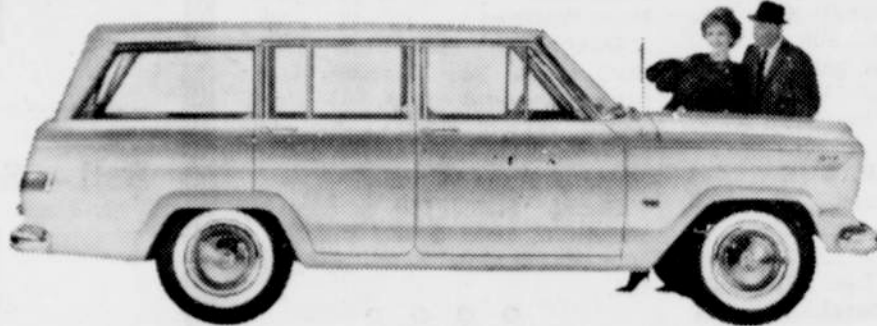
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
