

Final Rites Held At Catholic Church For William Norris

Recitation of the Rosary for William Francis (Bill) Norris was at 8 o'clock Monday evening, March 11, 1963, at Lienkaemper chapel. Requiem Mass was celebrated at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning at St. Bridget's Catholic church.

Mr. Norris, custodian at the local post office for the past two years, succumbed at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon following a brief illness.

He had been ailing for the past three weeks. He was taken to the doctor last Friday by Jack Clark of the Star hotel where he had been rooming during the winter months.

Immediately after returning to the hotel, he suffered a severe heart attack. That evening he was taken to the home of his sister, Mrs. Clyde Bowers in the Arcadia district. The following morning he suffered another attack and was taken to Malheur Memorial hospital where he succumbed.

The deceased was 66 years old, having been born Oct. 23, 1896, at Stonington, Ill., a son of Patrick and Anna Norris. He came to the Nyssa area in 1939 from Atkinson, Neb., after caring for his aged parents until their deaths. His mother died in 1938 and his father in 1939. He had remained in the Nyssa area since that time. He was a faithful member of St. Bridget's church. Mr. Norris had never been married.

Among survivors are two sisters, Mrs. Ellen Bowers of Arcadia and Marcella Mae Norris of Beatrice, Neb.; two nephews, Don and Bob Bowers of Nyssa. One sister and two brothers preceded him in death.

Burial was made in the Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Pallbearers were Emil Wohlcke, Francis Thiel, Nick Smit, Victor Habur-chak, Gregg Thiel and Herman Towne.

Smith Sees Removal Of Federal Deduction

A bill (HB 1076) to require certain employers to report and pay withholdings monthly is also expected to get favorable action in the House Taxation committee. This is frequently called a "one-shot" measure as it puts about \$7½ million in the 1963-65 biennium that would otherwise not be available until the succeeding biennium.

The cigarette tax proposal also appears to be headed for the House floor and is expected to pass. Proponents of the measure are not sure, however, that it will get through the Senate.

The measure which would double the tax on beer and wine and the bill to tax domestic insurance companies appear to have little chance of being approved by the House Tax committee, according to some members of the body.

Property Tax Relief Doubtful

The chances that property taxpayers will get any significant relief out of this session of the legislature appear to be very slim. There is a possibility that home "indirect" relief may come via an increase in basic school support funds, but the chances of any major increase being approved by both the House Education committee and the Ways and Means committee are not likely.

In addition to the fact that Ways and Means is not in an "increase the appropriation" mood, there is the problem of distribution. The present formula is not especially pleasing to either Multnomah county or to Eastern Oregon. These representatives are not ardent supporters of increased appropriations—unless there is some change in the method of distribution of the education funds. With all of the other problems facing this session, not very many are interested in re-hashing the distribution formula.

To Introduce Memorial

On Monday, March 11, I appeared before the House Rules committee with a request for that body to permit me to introduce a memorial to Congress having to do with tenure of grazing privileges on federal lands. The Natural resources committee, at my urging, has requested that this memorial be drafted. The memorial would request Congress of the United States to extend the time for Bureau of Land Management leases and permits.

The state of Oregon now leases most state lands on a 10-year renewable lease basis. The BLM within the past 15 years has come to a year-to-year renewal on leases by grazers. This memorial recognizes that the federal government has embarked on a program of rehabilitation of federal grazing lands under the administration of the BLM in Oregon in cooperation with permittees.

It recognizes that grazing fees upon lands administered by BLM have recently been increased by 50 percent, based upon the proposed rehabilitation, and that such effort will be a long and continuing process requiring expenditures of money, labor and management skill on the part of the permittees in cooperation with the BLM.

Asks Continuing Privileges

The memorial suggests that present tenure does not encourage cooperation and does not provide adequate security to warrant an increased contribution by the permittees toward long-range improvement practices. It asks Congress to recognize the multiple use in management theory and to provide for increased and continuing grazing privileges subject only to cancellation for failure of the permittee to cooperate in the management of the range.

It is my hope that the state of Oregon will go on record by expression of the legislature by endorsing the theory of long-term leases and permits for federal lands as well as state lands.

By providing for extended tenure, users of federal rangelands would be provided with a stabilizing factor in the operation of their farms and ranges and would be insured of a continued reinvestment by the federal government of the increases asked for in recent grazing fee increases.

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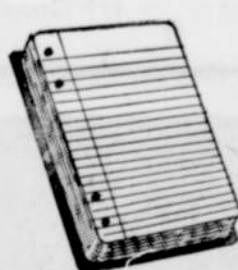
