Farm Bureau Head Requests Delay In Grain Voting

Harold Beach, president of the Oregon Farm Bureau federation, has asked Congress to defer voting on any new feed grain program until after the upcoming wheat referendum.

In a letter to Rep. Robert Duncan, Beach said, "The Pacific Northwest has suffered under the emergency program of the past three years and feeders in our area have been the innocent victims of such programs."

Beach said the sell-back provisions of the emergency feed grain programs have been designed to penalize the non-cooperator and used as a "tool placed in the hands of the secretary of agriculture to encourage feed grain producers to sign up in the program."

The "tool," according to Beach, was a million bushels of government-held milo and corn placed on the midwest market at as much as \$16 per ton under Pacific Northwest prices. Beach said the situation has improved but the elements are present for this to happen again.

The Farm Bureau head said the poultry business and the cattle and hog feeders are in serious trouble in Oregon now and that this trouble can be traced directly to managed grain prices. He said the Pacific Northwest has a tremendous potential for a red meat industry in this area if only the government feed grain programs were designed and administered in such a manner to allow the Pacific Northwest to compete.

Beach suggested the kind of feed grain program Congress should consider is largely dependent on the results of the forthcoming wheat referendum. The results will be known by June, he said, and Congress will still have time to enact feed grain legislation.

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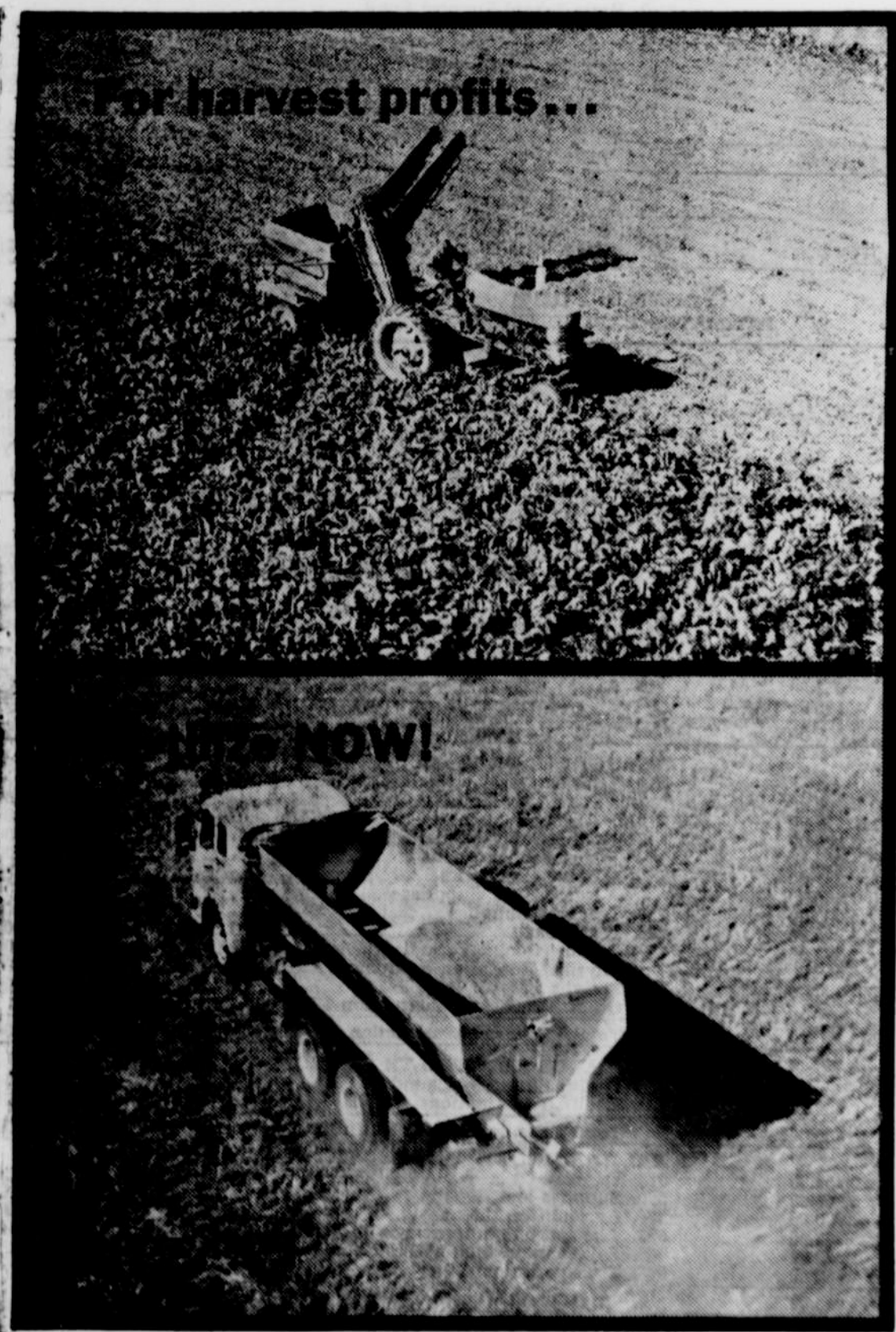
