

Win Over Ontario Features Opening Of Track Season

Last Tuesday, March 19, the 1963 edition of the Bulldog track team defeated the Ontario team by a score of 72-68. Nyssa took firsts in nine events to seven first places by Ontario. The Bulldogs made a clean sweep of the discus throw, while Ontario took all the points in the pole vault.

In the shot put, Duff took first place with a toss of 44 feet, 10 inches. Laurance, Duff and Glenn placed in that order in the discus. The distance was 129 feet, 10 1/2 inches.

McGinnis and Laurance took second and third in the javelin. The winning toss was 140 feet, 2 inches. Duff took second in the 65-yard high hurdles. Off came in second in the mile run. The winning time was 5:08.

Thompson and Schulthies took second in the high jump with a leap of 5 feet, 3 inches. Schulthies took first in the broad jump with 19 feet, 5 1/2 inches and Talbot took third place.

Doug Skeen won the 440-yard run in 54.4. Hendricks took the 110-yard low hurdles in 14 seconds. McGinnis took second in the 880-yard run. The winning time was 2:14. Talbot took the 220-yard dash in 24.4. Kerby came in third for this event.

Nyssa won the mile relay in 3:52 with a team composed of Jefferies, Smith, Oft and Anderson. The 880-yard relay was won by Nyssa in 1:44.2. The 440 was also won by Nyssa in 48.2.

Sen. A. Yturri Reports Activities at Capitol

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A hearing was held this week upon House Bill 1463 which would tax the churches. It is my opinion that churches serve a very useful purpose and were it not for their influence, the police protection problems would be far more serious and costly. I also believe that it would not be financially wise to tax that portion of religious organizations devoted to religious services.

This could result in many of the private schools, hospitals and charities being transferred to the people which in the long run could cost society a great deal more. Exemption of churches from ad valorem taxes has existed so long in our country as to become a principle, and it is my intention to vote against such a bill.

Hearings will commence today on the question of whether or not the people should vote again on capital punishment. This is a very emotional topic and proponents and opponents of capital punishment are equally vigorous and hopeful. It would be my guess that the legislature will again submit this matter to a vote of the people.

Tax Program Delayed

No final tax program has as yet emerged, and it appears that it will be several weeks before the Senate will have any income tax package to consider.

A curious situation exists with the matter of transfer of juvenile and probate jurisdiction to the circuit court. Harney county is opposed to the transfer, while the Malheur County Bar association is in favor of the transfer. I have not heard from Baker or Grant counties.

One suggestion has been made that the transfer of juvenile and probate matters to the circuit court occur in only those counties where the circuit judge resides. I would be pleased to receive the views of all counties on this suggestion.

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Nyssa Baseballers Down Adrian 8-4 In First Encounter

Forty-five aspirants to the 18 positions on the varsity and freshman baseball teams have been working out for the past month. They played their first game Tuesday against Adrian. Final score of the contest was 8 to 4 in Nyssa's favor. Jim Kodama and Sid Lancaster were batteries for the Bulldogs.

Coach Jack Bowen will be fielding a young and inexperienced team this year. The glaring weakness showing up so far is in batting strength. Coach Bowen feels that the pitching should be fair to good.

In league competition it looks as though Vale and Payette will be the strong teams to beat. Payette took a double header from Borah high of Boise last week, while Vale was finishing up the basketball season by taking third place in the A-2 tournament.

The Bulldogs have eight lettermen returning from last year's team. Kodama, Jones and Mayden are pitchers. Beck is a short stop, Skeen and Benedict are outfielders and Lancaster is a catcher. It looks as though a number of the vacancies in the lineup will be filled by sophomores.

Friday, March 29, at 4 p.m. on the local field the Bulldogs will meet Boise high school in their second game of the season.

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and calls for a starting salary of \$4,800 per year for a teacher with a bachelor of arts degree, \$4,960 with a five-year certificate and \$5,120 with a master's degree. The maximum salaries at these levels are \$6,110, \$6,430 and \$6,750, respectively.

The schedule calls for wage increases of \$50 per year for the first four years, then \$160 per year until the maximum is reached. The board hopes that raising the starting salary will not only allow Nyssa schools to be more competitive for new teachers, but also puts the scale more in line with other schools in the area.

Administrative Salaries Listed

Administrative salaries are superintendent, \$9,593; high school principal, \$8,318; elementary principal, \$8,228; junior high principal, \$7,950; and clerk-business manager, \$6,180. Secretaries salaries range from \$2,100 to \$3,650; and custodians salaries start at \$3,450, with pay raises of \$150 per year to a maximum of \$4,200.

The head custodian receives \$4,956; the transportation supervisor-mechanic receives \$5,352; and bus drivers are paid \$2.50 per trip.

The main increase in the transportation section in the budget is the need for a new school bus, as a new vehicle was not purchased last year. The increase in the costs of operating the plant are mainly roof and yard improvements.

There are more than 60 from the Nyssa community taking one or more courses, Voris said. Included in this figure are heads of families of Mexican descent now taking courses lasting 10 weeks with half the time used learning to read and write the English language and the other half spent on learning the operation and maintenance of farm machinery. Accreditation Troubles

Voris said the State System of Higher Education was the accrediting agency for the community colleges so that graduates would be acceptable at the state colleges and universities.

This was not working well for the new colleges, he said, for the supervisory agency was overly-critical of credits of prospective instructors in the community colleges. Their requirements were higher than any other accrediting agency in the U.S., Voris said. This restricts the courses that could be offered and added to the cost of instruction. The answer, he said, was to get out from under this board as soon as possible.
