National Science Grant Awarded To Tom Sallee

Congressman Al Ullman announced this week that two Malheur county residents have been awarded fellowships for advanced study by the National Science Foundation.

Robert Rettig, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Rettig, 1240 S.W. Third, Ontario, and Tom Sallee, son of Mr. and Mrs. George M. Sallee, 213 South Seventh, Nyssa, have been awarded fellowship grants of \$2200 and \$2000, respectively, for the 1963-64 academic year.

The awards are granted by the foundation to encourage outstanding students to obtain post-graduate training in the sciences on a full-time basis.

Rettig is an engineering student at the University of Wisconsin, and Sallee is studying mathematics at the University of California. Both are working for advanced degrees.

Graduate fellowship applicants were required to take examinations for scientific aptitude and achievement. Test scores, academic records and recommendations regarding each applicant's abilities were then considered by panels of outstanding scientists appointed by the National Academy of Sciences - National Research Council. The National Science Foundation then selected the awardees.

Livestock Valued At \$216 Million In Oregon Report

The value of livestock counted on Oregon farms and ranches as 1963 started totaled \$216 million with more beef cattle and turkeys than at the same time a year ago, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, Oregon State university extension agricultural economist.

The value of Oregon livestock was up nearly four percent from a year earlier. However, the state counted fewer milk cows, sheep, hogs and chickens than at the same time in 1962, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture reports and other information.

The increase in beef cows offset the drop in dairy cows, Mrs. Horrell noted, with total cattle and calf numbers unchanged at 1,435,000 head. Beef cows two years or older numbered 595,000, the highest on record. Milk cows two years or older totaled only 162,000 head on Jan. 1, lowest for that date since 1910.

Oregon counted 271,000 turkeys on Jan. 1, a seven percent increase from a year earlier. Chicken numbers, not including broilers, were down two percent to approximately 3,056,000, the fewest since annual records started in 1924.

Sheep and lambs, numbered at 777,000, were down eight percent to the lowest since 1953, while hogs, at 158,000, were down six percent, the lowest since 1958, Mrs. Horrell said.

Nationally, livestock trends on Jan. 1 were only a little different, the economist noted. The nation counted more beef cattle, hogs and turkeys and fewer milk cows, sheep and chickens. The combined value of all livestock was up five percent over the 1962 total.

Each bid must be unconditional, must be accompanied by a certified check or cashier's check in favor of the district, of or upon a bank doing business in the state of Oregon, in the sum of \$2,000, and must be enclosed in a sealed envelope addressed to the undersigned and marked on the outside "Proposal for Bonds." No interest will be allowed on the deposit with the bid, but the check of the successful bidder will be retained as part payment of the bonds or to secure the school district against any loss resulting from failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of the bid.
