

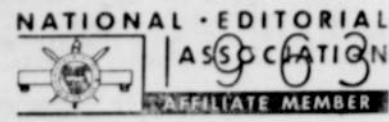

Funeral rites for Amy Elvira Topliff will be conducted at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, April 5, 1963, at Lienkaemper chapel. The Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa Methodist church will be officiating minister.

Mrs. Topliff succumbed Monday at Holy Rosary hospital in Ontario. She had been in failing health for several months.

She was born Oct. 17, 1900, in Haigler, Neb., a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Goodell and moved to Hale, Mo., in 1908 where she attended schools.

On Feb. 22, 1919, she was united in marriage to Leslie Topliff. They resided on a farm in Missouri until May, 1938, when they moved to the present home on Enterprise avenue near Nyssa.

While in Missouri, Mrs. Topliff was a member of the Methodist church, taught Sunday school and was church pianist. She was also a 4-H leader. She transferred her membership to Nyssa Methodist church and was an active member of the Women's Society of Christian Service. She was also a member of Out Our Way and Chatterbox clubs, the Farm Bureau and World War I Veterans' auxiliary.

In addition to Mr. Topliff of the home, she is survived by two sons, Edward of Hazelton, Idaho, and Irvin of route 1, Nyssa.

Also surviving are two brothers, William Goodell of Sunnyvale, Calif., and Charles Goodell of Glenwood, Iowa; a sister, Miss Elizabeth Goodell of Emmett, Idaho, and nine grandchildren.

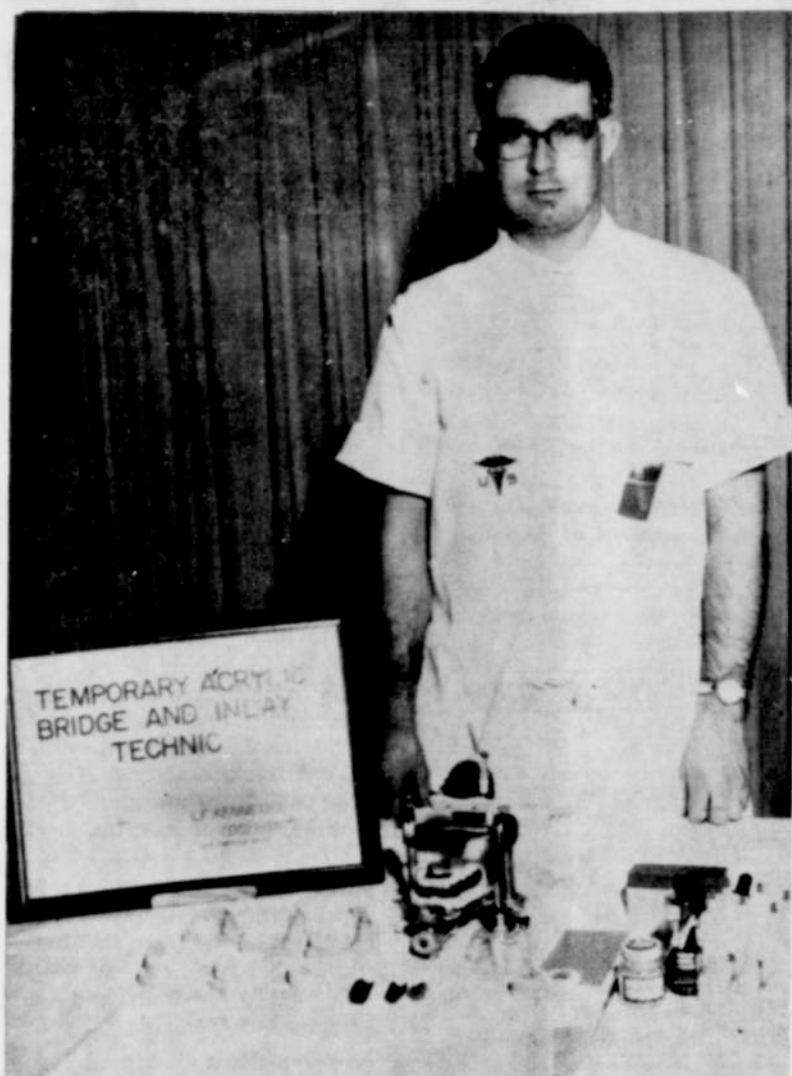

Lt. K. Cottle Presents Table Clinic At Mid-Winter Dental Convention

Lt. Kenneth L. Cottle, assistant dental officer aboard the USS Amphion (AR-13), Norfolk, Va., presented a table clinic at the 98th annual mid-winter dental convention in Chicago on Feb. 4. The clinic was entitled "Temporary Acrylic Bridge and Inlay Technic."

This technic is a method used to fabricate a temporary bridge, inlay or crown from acrylic for the patient to wear while the permanent appliance is being made. This method is used so that a presentable temporary, that looks much like the natural teeth in color, can be worn, with stabilization and support to the teeth used as anchors for a bridge, or for teeth prepared for crowns and inlays.

This temporary acts also to protect the teeth that have been prepared and the tissue surrounding the teeth from unnecessary wear and abrasion, and from food and the mouth's fluids.

The convention held in Chicago every February is one of the largest meetings of its type and lasts for four days. The meeting consists of manufacturer's displays and scientific exhibits, along with closed limited attendance clinics, table clinics, motion picture studies, demonstration clinics, essay and discussion forums on every type and phase of modern dentistry.

Dentists from all over the U. S. gather to discuss, exchange and learn new phases and products of the dental profession presented by those participating.

Dr. Cottle has been invited to present his table clinic at the 104th annual session of the American Dental association at Atlantic City, N.J., on Oct. 14-17.

The assistant dental officer is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Kay Cottle of Nyssa.

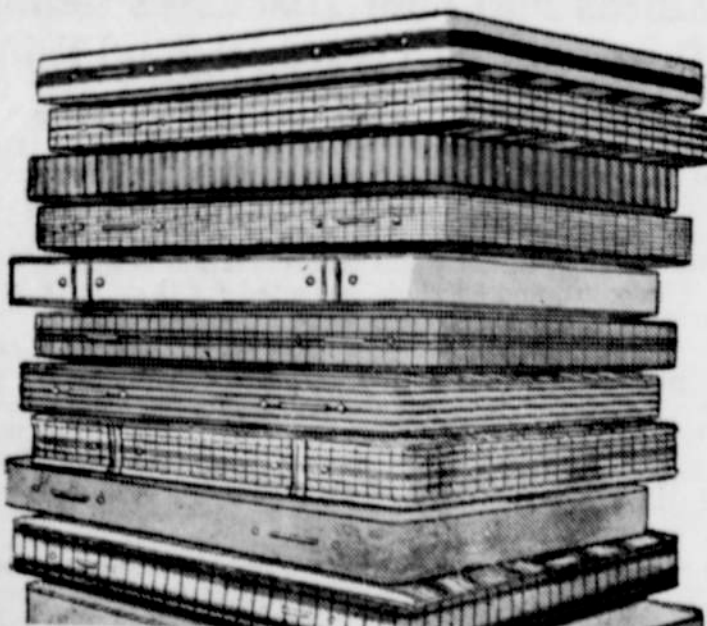
