Farmers Must Register Before May 14 For Balloting in Wheat Referendum

"Farmers who have been raising wheat under the '15-acre' provision of the past legislation may qualify themselves to vote in the forthcoming wheat referendum by registering their election to comply with their farm wheat acreage allotment with their county ASC office on or before May 14, 1963," stated R. E. Schedeen, chairman of Oregon ASC State committee. Schedeen spoke last week at a meeting of ASC committeemen held in Moore hotel.

County and community committeemen from Baker, Harney and Malheur counties heard Schedeen add, "Exercising this election will also make the 'small farm' eligible to receive price support, marketing allocation certificates and land diversion payments upon complying with the provisions of such programs should the wheat referendum receive a yes vote from two-thirds or more of the voting wheat producers of the nation."

Registration will consist of signing the election statement found on the reverse side of the "notice of 1964 wheat farm acreage allotment, small farm base and farm marketing quota" and returning the notice to the ASC county office on or before May 14, 1963. Notices will be mailed by the county office in the near future.

Only Chance for Small Farmers

After that date there will be no further opportunity for the "small farm" operator to avail himself of the benefits which may be derived from participation in 1964 wheat program. These farms will

not be eligible for price support, wheat certificates, for land diversion payments or to vote in referendum.

However, they may without penalty plant an acreage of wheat based on their 1959-60 or 1961 average wheat acreage but not over 15 acres.

Other speakers at the meeting included Arnold N. Bodtker, state executive director who outlined the objectives of the wheat portion of the "food and agricultural act of 1962" and the alternatives open to wheat producers who vote in the referendum. Allen Jacobs, ASCS farmer fieldman for Eastern Oregon, spoke and presented slides explaining the 1964 wheat program.

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
