ensembles and solos preparing for music festivals.

**Low Drop-Out Rate**

The drop-out rate before graduation is 43 percent on the national level, over 90 percent in Boise schools and less than 10 percent in Nyssa. Of 91 who started music in the sixth grade 84 are still active now that they have reached the sophomore year.

Smith told a Journal reporter that he credited the low drop-out rate to the following factors: (a) a nine-week testing program before letting students touch an instrument, (b) a three-month rental with option to buy instruments, (c) students starting music in the sixth grade must continue through the seventh and eighth grades, (d) a summer program lasting eight weeks in which 75 to 80 students participated.

**Petitions Being Circulated**

Board members said they would be glad to consider a request to add into the budget funds for an assistant if there were a large number of people wanting this. Petitions are being circulated in the Nyssa business district and in rural areas asking for the assistant. These will be presented to the board prior to the budget hearing April 16.
